Famine Committee Launches Program

PORTLAND, March 28 (AP)—The Oregon food for famine relief committee has launched the first of a series of programs aimed at saving 20,000 tons of wheat and 500 tons of fats and oils in Oregon in the next 90 days.

General Chairman Joseph K. Carson, former Portland mayor, last night told an assembly of 125 state leaders of trade groups, civic and service organizations and schools and churches that every Oregon resident would be asked to abstain from eating three slices of bread and using one teaspoon of fats or oils each day.

He said it would mean a reduction of 40 per cent of bread and 20 per cent of fats and oils used.
