

Line Oregon Wives Will Join Husbands Overseas

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—Oregon wives and four children will be included in the group of 1200 dependents who will travel to Europe in mid-April to join army fathers stationed there.

The journey, arranged by the War Department, will be the first movement of military dependents to the European theater of operations.

The April contingent includes immediate families of 700 servicemen, 24 of them from the ranks. It covers all army units who requested transportation for their dependents during April.

Army Air Base Will Fold Up

PORTLAND, March 28 (AP)—The Portland army airbase will be turned over to the city of Portland to caretaker status by April 30, Lt. Col. R. E. Shafer, commanding officer, said today.

He said orders received from the fourth air force said the base was expected to become a field for transient service and or flying, or both. The post will remain stocked, serviced and ready to accommodate a force of 1500 at any time.

The present staff of 150 officers and 400 enlisted men will be reduced to five officers, 25 enlisted men and about 100 civilian workers. Shafer said the part of the present force would leave within two weeks.

46 Spud Support Shows Decrease

The department of agriculture supplemented its earlier announcement of a 1946 potato support program with a schedule of support prices for U. S. No. 1 potatoes sacked and loaded f.o.b. carrier. The new schedule provides a support price of 20 cents a hundredweight in 1945. For Oregon, basic support prices in Malheur, Baker, Union and Wallowa counties range from \$1.55 to \$1.90 in December, and the rest of the state, from \$1.85 in September to \$2.10 in December.

Prices of intermediate crop potatoes will be supported through direct purchases, and late-crop potatoes through a support program. September 15 is the dividing line between the two types of operations. Prices for grades below U. S. No. 1 will be supported when and if conditions require it, and there will be no general announcement of support levels for U. S. No. 2.

In 1945, Oregon producers obtained price support loans on more than a half billion hundredweight of the crop, 11,340,000 bushel crop.

Extension Unit News

Safe canning of meats, fish and non-acid vegetables requires a pressure cooker with an accurate pressure gauge, according to Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen, Klamath county home demonstration agent. Pressure cookers that have not been tested for two years or more should be mailed or brought to her office, room 208, federal building in Klamath Falls before April 20.

The food technology department of Oregon State college will test gauges during the month of April only. The charge is 50 cents, which includes return postage. Gauges should be sent with money either to your home demonstration agent or directly to E. H. Wiegand, food

technology department, Oregon State college, Corvallis, Oregon.

The gauge is breakable and should be well padded and wrapped in a tin can or cardboard box, and name and address attached directly to the back of the gauge with tape, not with string. A piece of cardboard across the face is desirable. The best way to detach the gauge from the cooker is with a flat wrench. Pliers may damage metal.

This testing service is limited this year to the period from April first to April 13, and gauges sent in after that time cannot be tested, Mrs. Gillen emphasizes.

Cutting Resumed At Big Sawmill

Lumbermen here were interested to learn that the Medford Corporation's big sawmill north of Medford resumed cutting Monday according to Manager B. L. Nutting.

The mill has been idle since February 2, to permit overhaul and installation of new machinery. Although some of the employees have been used during the shutdown, resumption of operation will furnish continuous employment for the full 375 men. A total cut for the year is anticipated at 75,000,000 feet. Forty per cent of the mill's output will be house construction lumber under the HH rating system of priority for veterans. A new 10 by 84-inch stub edger was installed as well as a new steel carriage for the right rig, together with new electric dogs.
