

Drug Orders Coal Reserve

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—The solid fuels administration issued two orders designed to provide a reserve of coal for consumers "desperately in need" during the nine-day shutdown.

Secretary J. A. Krug, interior, said the orders would care for the "most desperate cases for a short time" following the work stoppage.

The orders direct operators of soft coal mines in all two producing districts to place coal "on track" at the beginning of midnight today.

Operators were further directed not to ship any after midnight Sunday except by permission of the solid fuels administrator.

The effect of the order to coal on mine trucks, Krug would be to accumulate the mines the equivalent of full day's production.

The second order, directed to all coal dealers and tide- and lake dock operators, is deliveries of coal to certain types of consumers. This order is effective as of 12:01 p.m. April 1.

Cycle Owners Purchase Licenses

Sale of licenses to Klamath bicycle owners reached the half-million mark as compared to 800,000 licenses last year, with 400 bicycles registered Wednesday.

SOCE Shows Gain In Registration

At the close of the first day of registration at the Southern Oregon college, a total of 148 students had completed their registration. This is a gain of 179 per cent over the same quarter last year. A total of 105 men were enrolled as compared with 45 women, and for the second time in recent years the men far outnumbered the women.

This large increase in the enrollment of men is due to returning veterans entering college training under the GI bill. Eighty-five veterans are now in attendance, of which two are women.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 28 (AP)—The supply of sensitized photographic goods and chemicals for civilian trade this year "will exceed that of any previous year in the company's history," the Eastman Kodak company said today in its annual report.

Return to full camera production, however, has been delayed by the shortage of raw materials and by necessary reconversion of the Rochester plants from war to peacetime products, the company said.
