

Psychiatrist Talks On American Way Of Life At Meeting

Speaking to an enthusiastic audience of Knife and Fork club members and their guests last night, Dr. Beryl D. Orris, noted psychiatrist, stated that if the American way of life is to be successful, it must be lifted from the realm of theory and translated into action.

Dr. Orris spoke to the group in the Willard hotel banquet room, on the topic, "Where Do We Go From Here?"

"The only course is to go straight ahead, looking neither to the right nor left, but only at the obstacles and the goal ahead," he said.

Traveled Widely
The speaker has traveled widely in Europe, and was in Vienna in 1936 when Austria fell to the nazis. He recounted that on the night the official announcement of the fall of Austria was broadcast, there were already German troops in the streets of Vienna.

By morning German propagandists had converted all electric signs in the city into flood-lighted pictures of Hitler and slogans of the nazi party, with wreaths of flowers strung from lamp posts, and swastikas everywhere in preparation for Hitler's triumphal parade from the airfield to the palace where he was

to speak. Behind every window facing the street through which he was to pass, armed guards were stationed, and the streets were lined with armed storm troopers.

Of Hitler, Dr. Orris said, "If the man were not insane before that day, he certainly was then. His speech was the best example of mass hypnosis I have ever heard. The combination of his words, his sincerity, gestures, and wild rage, seemed to go out to his audience."

Arrested
Not long after, Dr. Orris was arrested by the Germans. "These are memories which one hopes to live long enough to be able to forget," he said. Eventually he was released through the efforts of the American embassy and was advised to leave the country. He left with one suitcase, currency amounting to about \$150 in American money, and his train ticket. After the most complete examination to which he had ever been subjected, he was permitted to cross the border into France, then to England, and finally to return to America.

Assertions
In his contact with Americans after his return, Dr. Orris found that "everybody is anti-something, and nobody is pro-something." He explained that the same attitude was prevalent in Europe prior to the war, and stressed the necessity of developing a "pro-attitude," particularly "pro-American," but not to the extent of ignoring or feeling superior to other countries.

He asserted, "True patriotism, like true religion, is not talked about but lived."
Dr. Orris summarized that everyone knows the kind of world he wants, a world free of war, crime, and the other social evils, but that the only way to get that world is for each individual to strive for that goal immediately.

He is planning to return to Europe in the near future.
Dr. Orris was introduced by the Rev. D. J. Ferguson of Merrill. Following his talk, he answered numerous questions from his appreciative audience.

Former GI Gripes Over Army Distinctions In Social Life

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—The trouble with the army, a former GI told the board studying enlisted men's rights today, is that it makes too many distinctions in its social life.

Joe McCarthy, a former master sergeant who was editor of Yank magazine, said there was no complaint with the way the army ran its business during working hours.

"It's when the men turn to their social life that all the trouble starts in," he said.

McCarthy, who lives in New York City, and is now working for Cosmopolitan magazine, told reporters what he had testified before the board. The board, headed by Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle, is having a closed session, to encourage plain talking.

McCarthy, who was the only witness to appear this morning, said that when an outfit was in combat there was no difficulty between officers and enlisted men. But when it came back from the front he said, officers got special privileges and the discontent started.

His suggestion: Clubs for enlisted men similar to officers' clubs, with similar food and liquor.

"In no way," he said, "do I recommend that there be any breakdown in the discipline of the army. It's just that the enlisted man should have the same rights as the officers."

Army Seeks Enlistments

Information has been received by the Klamath Falls army recruiting office from the war department regarding the enlistment and reenlistment of former servicemen who have exceeded the 90-day reenlistment time limit.

Men who were honorably discharged or released under honorable conditions may, provided the enlistment is accomplished on or before June 30, 1946, be enlisted in grades appropriate to their former training and experience.

Another offer made by the war department to men who have had previous experience in an armored force is to enlist them directly in the 2nd armored division which is now stationed at Camp Hood, Tex. These men may enlist in the 2nd armored division regardless of the time that has elapsed since their discharge. Enlistment in the army for placement in the 2nd armored division must be accomplished prior to April 7, 1946.

The 2nd armored division, fondly known as "Hell on Wheels," the division which fought from North Africa through Sicily, Italy, and on into France and Germany, is now stationed at Camp Hood, Tex.

Garage Moved From Park Site

MERRILL, March 28—Johnson's garage, owned and operated by Conrad Johnson, is being moved this week from the Mallin community park site to a new location north of the Big Basin Lumber company. The move is in preparation for actual construction work on the \$150,000 park project scheduled to get under way early in April.

The garage and repair shop occupied by Johnson since 1937 is being cut into three sections and the building will be raised and a full concrete floor added before it is ready for occupancy about May 1.

Other buildings which include a potato cellar and residence will be moved in the near future.

Newman Advanced To Rank Of Major

Capt. Victor E. Newman, chaplain in the United States army, has been advanced to the rank of major, according to word received here by Mrs. Newman, 528 Pacific Terrace.

The officer, former rector of St. Paul's here, is now serving in Rome, Italy, in charge of St. Paul's Episcopal church. He has been overseas for the past three years.

OPA Sues Firm For \$1,125,000

KANSAS CITY, March 28 (AP)—The office of price administration today filed suit in federal court asking damages of \$1,125,000 from the Singer Sewing Machine company for alleged violations of maximum price regulations.

The complaint, filed by Dick Bennett, OPA district enforcement attorney, charged the company had violated price ceiling regulations and had forced purchasers of sewing machines to buy other commodities, contrary to restrictions against tie-in sale. The petition said violations complained of had occurred throughout the United States.

Specifically, the complaint charged the company sold used sewing machines at new machine ceiling prices.

Overcharges
The OPA said a survey of regional outlets showed actual overcharges of \$375,000 in sale

of used sewing machines between July 1, 1945, and February 28, 1946.

An injunction is sought to require the company to determine properly the maximum prices for used sewing machines and to refrain from selling at prices in excess of the maximum allowable and to refrain from requiring the purchase of other commodities.

Bennett said the case originated from the complaint of a Kansas City housewife several months ago that a Singer outlet store here would not sell her a sewing machine unless she also bought a sewing cabinet.

Verified Complaint
"An investigator not only verified the complaint of the housewife with respect to the tie-in agreement," Bennett said, "but also found that the Kansas City store was selling as new merchandise sewing machines which had been out on rental."

This led to investigation of other stores in Kansas City and St. Joseph, Mo., and the records
