A beautifully balanced program where the audience refused to leave the theatre until three encores were generously presented by Ethel Bartlett and Rae Robertson, duo-piano team, brought the 1945-46 Klamath Community Concert association to a marvelous climax Wednesday night at the Pelican theatre.

Anyone who attended that concert just because he wanted to use his membership ticket, had the surprise of his life when Bartlett and Robertson, between the two of them, combined to give one of the musical treats of this as well as several other years.

They brought their original program to a close with impeccable musicianship in their playing of Franz Liszt' Hungarian Rhapsody, No. 2. It was a thrilling end to a fine performance and Bartlett and Robertson responded with a first encore, Liszt' Liebestraum, playing in a delicate, beautiful vein. Instead of being satisfied, this only whetted the appetite of an exceptionally appreciative audience, and Meolo's "Brazilian Dance" with all its gaiety, followed. A thunderous applause was the response to the Melo number, and the team again responded with the Rachmaninoff favorite, "Prelude in C Sharp Minor." Other encores during the evening were Gluck's "Gavotte" and Saint-Saens' "Summer Wind."

Venture Club

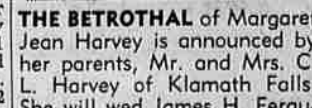
