

# Peru Program Heard By Club

Latin American countries were the theme for a delightful program at the weekly luncheon of the Soroptimist club on Monday. Mrs. Kay Benham, who lived some time in Peru, gave an interesting talk on Peru, its geography, its people and its customs. Mrs. Benham stated that Peru has three distinct types of country, the jungle, the mountains and the coastal plains, where almost all of the agriculture is carried on.

The mountainous portion is barren and for the most part inhabitable except by the Indians, many of whom still live on the steep slopes of the Andes. Wherever they can find a small patch of ground, plant a corn, and transport it to the coast by llamas, which are the principal beasts of burden in Peru and valued highly.

About 75 per cent of the population lives in Lima, which is a beautiful city. Going into the interior one finds the roads very narrow. They have a one-way traffic on most of them, and the narrow days are set for going and coming out to the coast. The Indians of Peru, formerly tall people, are now of small stature, probably due to the fact that few of them really have an adequate diet. They are primitive people, but very capable. The llama also furnishes clothing for the natives and its wool is carded, dyed and woven into garments, and some of the designs are intricate. Their clothing is also very colorful, a lot of magenta or brilliant pink being the favorite.

Mrs. Benham also said that Peru is a very rich country in its minerals and in its natural resources, because there are many rich mines, and also oil and gas wells belong to American corporations. Most of the workers in these mines are Peruvians. Mrs. Benham brought with her many articles made by Peruvian Indians for display, and some of the work was very beautiful. Her talk was very much appreciated by her audience and she answered a great many questions about Peru and its people.

The second part of the program was a splendid film of Uruguay which was a decided contrast to the picture Mrs. Benham gave of Peru. Uruguay is a rich agricultural land, and extremely modern in its schools, buildings and social structure. Sheep and cattle raising are very important industries also.

Isabelle Brixner was program chairman and introduced Mrs. Benham and showed the film on Uruguay. Alice Lamm presided at the meeting and welcomed guests of the club, Mrs. Bert Schultz of San Jose, Mrs. J. M. Bedford of Sealton, Calif., and Mrs. Twyla Ferguson.

Several announcements were made and a committee appointed to wrap more bundles of food and clothing for Holland, to be distributed by Soroptimists at the Hague. This has been the principal project of the club the past winter and there has been 90 per cent participation by the members.
