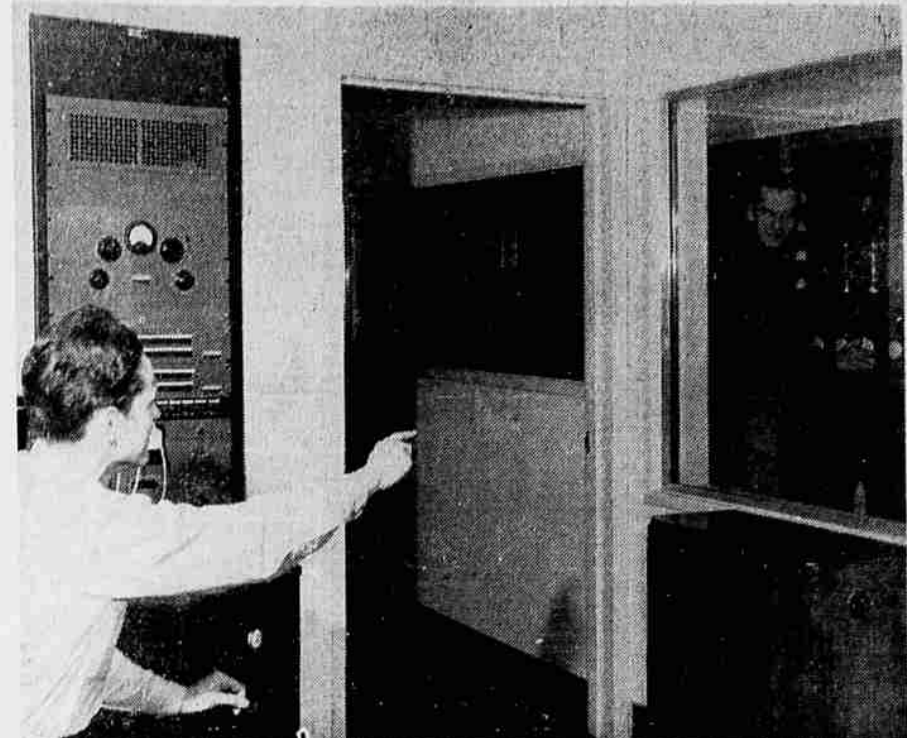


KFLW Inaugural Broadcast Set Tomorrow At 2 P.M.

 The inaugural broadcast, Bob McCarl will conduct a man on the street program from 8th and Main at 12:15 p. m., Malcolm Epperson, The Herald and News managing editor, gives the story behind local happenings at 4:15 and Don Neal talks sports every afternoon at 5:45.
 Daily national features to be heard from ABC include Breakfast Club, Glamour Hour, Tom Brenneman's Breakfast in Hollywood, My True Story, and in the afternoon many women's features as well as Jack Armstrong, Dick Tracy, and several other serials of juvenile-interest.
 Weekly features include the Ford Sunday Evening hour, Quiz Kids, Gangbusters, Bob Will and his Texas Playboys, Madison Square Garden fights, Theatre Guild of the Air, Hall of Fame and others. A daily schedule of KFLW programs will be printed in The Herald and News.
 From boss to janitor KFLW has a staff of 15 persons, including four announcers, four technicians, advertising man, receptionist, bookkeeper and so on.
 Plans are made now to have remote broadcasts of many local events, and other happenings of local interest.
 Everything points to a new era on the ether for the Klamath basin beginning tomorrow at 2 p. m.

Lumber Workers To Get Pay Hike
 WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—A new wage increase ceiling for approximately 125,000 workers in the west coast lumber industry will be approved, the national wage stabilization board said yesterday.
 The increases are for pricing purposes and authorize 15 cents an hour above rates in effect on August 17, 1945.
 The board estimated that 2500 firms are involved. It said that a majority of lumber concerns in Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho and Montana already had established a 15-cent increase pattern between August 17, 1945 and February 14, 1946.

Appeal Filed In Dairy Case
 SALEM, March 30 (AP)—E. L. Peterson, director of agriculture, filed an appeal in the state supreme court here Saturday, seeking to collect poundage fees under the state milk control act from a Klamath Falls dairy for the sale of butterfat in California.
 Judge David R. Vandenberg ruled in favor of the defendants, the Lost River dairy, in circuit court action in Klamath county.
 Peterson contends that the defendants are liable for poundage fees from alleged sales of 374,000 pounds of butterfat from May, 1942 until November 1944, all of which was sold to California consumers.

Solons Favor A-Bomb Test
 WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—The weight of congressional opinion tipped heavily today in favor of holding the Bikini A-bomb tests this summer, although three senators protested this is a bad time for such an awesome experiment.
 Several senators interested in atomic energy developments said they are flatly opposed to calling off the tests, as suggested in yesterday's senate resolution by Senators Huffman (D-Ohio) and Lucas (D-Ill.) Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) backed the resolution, however.
 The Bikini tests originally were scheduled to begin approximately May 15, but President Truman ordered them postponed six weeks to make possible the attendance of congressmen who would be kept away on the earlier date because of the press of legislative matters.
 The Huffman-Lucas attack on plans to test atomic bombs on ships at the Marshall island lagoon was based on their assertion that any such demonstration might be misinterpreted by other nations as evidence the United States is preparing for war.

No Smallpox Cases Reported In County
 There have been no cases of smallpox reported in Klamath county this spring although several coast cities are having an epidemic of the disease.
 Smallpox vaccinations are being given at the Klamath county public health clinic and various physicians here. Two cases of diphtheria have been reported here recently.

Alturas Men Unhurt In Auto Accident
 A 1941 De Soto coupe driven by Paul Leo Carter of Alturas turned over after hitting the gravel shoulder of the road about 13 miles out of Klamath Falls on the Merrill highway at 11:15 this morning.
 Neither the driver nor his passenger, F. E. Minnerup Jr., also of Alturas, was injured, but the car was reported to be badly damaged.
 The name Guatemala means land of the trees.

9 Persons Hurt In Manila Blaze
 MANILA, March 30 (AP)—Nine persons were injured and the newly reestablished coast geodetic survey headquarters was destroyed in a spectacular fire today.
 The fire, of undetermined origin, virtually burned out the plant of the Fookien Times, Manila's largest Chinese newspaper, and roared through two blocks of apartments and warehouses in the Binondo district that escaped Japanese arsonists a year ago.
 Yesterday, another fire destroyed approximately \$200,000 worth of army supplies in a quartermaster depot.
