

84 Members Signed Up By Chamber

Eighty-four new members have been signed up to Monday morning in the current campaign of the Klamath county chamber of commerce, according to Chairman Alice Vitus. The drive closes at 5 p. m. Wednesday.

Although the over-all quota of 75 new members has been exceeded, several individual workers are still rustling to qualify for some of the attractive prizes being offered in the contest. Each worker signing two results becomes eligible for the membership club, which is a new group within the chamber of commerce comparable to the 40 at 8 within the American Legion. Special get-togethers of the membership club will be held from time to time.

Merchandise Award
Workers securing four new members become eligible for a merchandise award, while four additional members brings them a different prize. Grand award for the highest individual in the contest is a Sunbeam electric mixer now on display in the window of the chamber of commerce.

Reds Blamed For Manchu Situation

CHUNGKING, April 1 (AP)—China has requested Russia to give previous notice of Soviet withdrawal from various points in Manchuria and to permit government troops to enter them beforehand to assure a smooth transfer of garrison duties, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek told the people's political council today.

At the same time he blamed the communists for the Manchurian situation. Chiang said no communist troops were in the territory before Japan's surrender but entered the country after the Japanese collapse and hindered its occupation by government forces.

The generalissimo said the request to the Russians was contained in China's March 27 reply agreeing to Soviet withdrawal from Manchuria not later than April 30, as proposed in the Russian note of March 22.

Circle Changchun
Communist troops were reported surrounding Changchun, Manchurian capital which the Soviets are expected to leave soon.

Lt. Gen. Tung Wen-ping, chief of the Chinese military mission in Changchun, telephoned Mukden's Mayor Tung Wen-chi yesterday and was reported to have declared that the Soviets would not complete their withdrawal from the capital until government troops arrived to take over. Telephone service was disrupted between the two points shortly after their conversation.

Another hope of avoiding further bloodshed in Manchuria was the presence in Mukden of four cease-fire teams dispatched by the Sino-American executive headquarters of Mukden. However, they were still in Mukden awaiting further instructions.

The three truce commissioners, General Chang Chih-chung, General Chou En-lai and Lt. Gen. Alvan C. Gillem were expected in Mukden today or tomorrow.

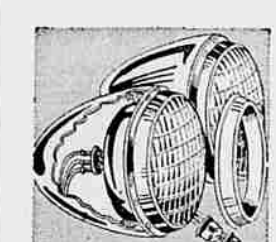

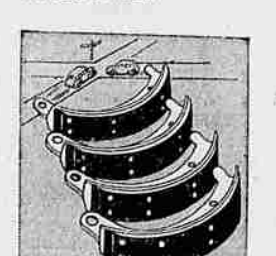
