## WHEAT

CHICAGO, April 1 (AP) — A sharp run-up in May rye at Winnipeg swung traders reluctantly over to the buying side here most of the time today and prices were bid substantially higher. The delivery at the Canadian market was up the 5-cent daily limit at times, but the advance here generally was limited to around half that range. Oats, which opened slightly weaker in a slow trade, also met a fair demand along with rye. Some of the buying was from nervous short interests who had said they preferred to deal only for protective purposes until some expected developments were forthcoming from Washington. The trade generally watched closely for some indications of what the final price might be in the house food committee's investigation. There also was considerable interest in what the department of agriculture might issue certificates for wheat purchases to protect sellers of the grain against any price advances until March 1, 1947. The proposal was offered as a possible method of inducing producers to sell surplus stocks to the Commodity Credit corporation for use in its export program. Wheat and corn held again at ceiling prices of \$1.83 1/2 and \$1.21 1/2. Oats finished unchanged to 1/2 cent above Saturday's close, May \$2-cent ceiling. Rye unchanged to 2 1/2 advanced, May \$2.21 1/2; barley unchanged to 1/2 up, May \$1.26 1/2 ceiling.

## Bowles Swings At Farm Rider

WASHINGTON, April 1 (AP) — Stabilization Director Chester Bowles today declared the cost of living would jump 6 per cent or more under the farm parity formula passed by the senate. The plan, which allows farm labor costs to be considered in figuring parity prices, was tacked to the minimum wage bill although a presidential veto is threatened. The bill still is pending in the senate. Bowles said the amendment would shoot retail food prices up about 15 per cent and increase the average family's annual food budget around \$125, besides forcing an increase of 7 per cent in store prices on cotton garments. He called it sharply inflationary.

## Many Vaccinated For Smallpox Here

Klamath county public health department was busy this morning, vaccinating fifty persons against smallpox. Local doctors were also busy with vaccinations although no cases of smallpox have been reported in the county to date. Several cases of chickenpox, measles and a few of scarlet fever are reported in the county now by Dr. Peter Rozendal, public health officer.
