

Reassessment Of Indian Policy Eyed By Congress

WASHINGTON, April 1 (AP)—Chairman of the two congressional committees on Indian affairs are considering whether a reassessment of the federal Indian policy is needed in the light of postwar conditions.

The record of the Indians in services, their ready response to the draft and their response to the labor needs of war industry indicates that we must reassess the whole method of handling Indians," says Senator O'Malley (D-Wyo.), who heads the senate committee.

And Chairman Jackson (D-Wash.) of the house committee revealed that he is considering open hearings to learn what steps the Indian bureau is taking "to re-orient the Indian back to civilian life."

Broader Outlook
The Indian bureau already has anticipated the attitude of the congressmen and its interest has been stimulated by indications that the homecoming tribesmen have acquired a broader outlook during their absence from the reservations.

More than 40,000 Indians went away during the war years to take industrial jobs. Another 25,000 went into the armed services, many winning citations for merit. They are coming back slowly.

The Indian bureau thus far finds the greatest change in the attitude of the Indians toward education.

"There have been more requests for Navajo schools than ever before," said John H. Province, assistant commissioner of Indian affairs. "Servicemen apparently have been writing back to their parents urging them to see that younger members of the family attend school."

Some Progress
He said some progress has been made in rehabilitating veterans in agricultural pursuits and that others have obtained loans for small businesses like silver working. The veterans bureau, he observed, has been very cooperative.

Jackson said his committee next week will consider amendments to the bill setting up a commission to settle all Indian claims and that the measure will be brought to the floor the following week. He regards this bill as the first essential to making the Indians independent of government control.

The commission, he said, will simplify administrative procedure, reduce the costs of the Indian service and pave the way for the assimilation of these citizens into the community life.

Jewish Fund Drive Starts In Oregon
PORTLAND, April 1 (AP)—The Oregon campaign to raise \$355,000 of the national \$1,000,000 United Jewish appeal got under way here today after a public meeting at which J. Howard McGrath, solicitor general of the United States, declared the fund meant life or death for European Jews who survived the Nazi efforts to slaughter the race.

The former governor of Rhode Island who was a consultant to the Anglo-American commission on Palestine, said only 25 per cent of European Jews receive UNRRA aid.

THE DALLES, April 1 (AP)—North central Oregon has great irrigation water supplies than at any time in the past. The annual water forecast report filed here over the weekend indicated.

Teachers Back County Boards

PORTLAND, April 1 (AP)—The Oregon State Teachers association council tabled action on a state house bill to create county school boards and a county tax system, but announced before closing sessions here Saturday it would support a November referendum seeking higher state revenues for school tuition.

The association also voted to rename the group the Oregon Education association.

Frank Bennett, Salem superintendent of schools and chairman of the group's school support committee, told the council the referendum proposal would produce an estimated \$15,000,000 annually from a property levy of 15 mills. It would provide \$50 per pupil for instruction.

He said the measure would replace the existing legislation for a 10 mill levy which raises \$10,000,000 annually.

A similar measure was defeated in 1944 by a narrow margin, but Bennett said he believes the new measure will be "more understandable."

'Lonely Hearts' Head Waits Jolt
DETROIT, April 1 (AP)—Mrs. Beulah Brill, 39-year-old Port Huron, Mich., housewife, accused of defrauding more than 100 bachelors through her "Lonely Hearts" club, was awaiting sentence today after pleading guilty before Federal Judge Ernest A. O'Brien.

She was released under \$500 bond and her case referred to the probation department.

In eight years, according to U. S. District Attorney Thomas P. Thornton, Mrs. Brill admitted receiving about \$1700 and a diamond ring from her correspondents.

147,000 Autos Goal Of Frazer

DETROIT, April 1 (AP)—Joseph W. Frazer, president of the Kaiser-Frazer Corp., said today his company has scheduled production of 147,000 passenger cars this year at nearby Willow Run.

Frazer told a news conference the first of the Frazer vehicles, in the medium-price bracket, will come from the lines late next month and that in July the production of 8000 units is projected.

The first of the Kaiser cars, in the low-price field, probably will be assembly-line produced about July 15, he said. About 90,000 of the year's total production, he added, will come in the final quarter of the year.
