

Plan Proposed To Shift Alley From KUHS Field

A petition proposing a change in the location of an alley which would interfere with the completion of the new Klamath Union high school practice football field adjoining Modoc field, was read before the city council last night.

Signed by Nelson Reed, chairman of the school board, the petition explained that the alley in its present location cuts across one corner of the field and proposed that the angle of the alley be changed. The change was stated to be acceptable to property holders in that area so long as the new alley will be at least as good as the old one which has been improved by property owners.

The field will take in the territory where the tennis courts were located, and a drainage system will be installed with the relocation of a hot water pipe line, and other necessary changes and improvements. Lots which will be affected by the change of the alley's location are lots 11 to 18 on block five of second Hot Springs addition.

E. A. Thomas, city engineer, answered the council's question on the traffic safety of such a change by saying that the new alley would probably be better than the old from that standpoint.

Refer Matter
The council voted to refer the matter to the city attorney with a report forthcoming at the next meeting.

The city fathers were somewhat dubious about the request that the city all out for Recreation park in Industrial addition with particular reference to baseball this summer. Lynn Roycroft told the council that \$2500 will be needed to put the field into good shape, with the American Legion supplying the upkeep. The council objected to spending that amount of money on what it considered a "temporary affair," and put itself on record as willing to consider putting a few hundred dollars, but definitely not \$2500, into the park, still with an eye to the construction of a permanent field later.

Asks Opinion
City Engineer E. A. Thomas asked for the council's opinion on the matter of a petition requesting the paving of Doty and unpaved sections of 7th and 8th streets. A peculiar situation arose, in that it is questionable that the assessed value of the property is equal to the cost of paving. The council decided to meet with the finance committee, setting a tentative date for 4 p. m. Friday.

The council okayed a request from Maj. John M. Clayton of the local army recruiting office that during April, designated by Governor Earl Snell as Army Recruiting Month, the recruiting office be permitted to have blue arrows painted on the sidewalk leading to the office located in the federal building.

The reading of licenses and property sales closed the first April meeting of the council.

Shaw Proposes Medical Plan

LONDON, April 2 (P)—George Bernard Shaw suggested today that a simple solution for the current private-versus-public medicine debate in Britain would be adoption of the Swedish idea of paying doctors for keeping their patients well.

"The monstrosity of the present system of private practice in medicine," the playwright said in a letter to the Times, "is that it gives doctors a vested interest in disease, which they are defending desperately. We, the victims, support them because we want doctors of our own friendly choice and no strangers planted on us by the state."

"The solution is simple. In Sweden, the most civilized country in western Europe, the private doctor is paid an agreed fee for keeping the family well throughout the year."

"Why not make it obligatory and abolish payment by the job ruthlessly?"

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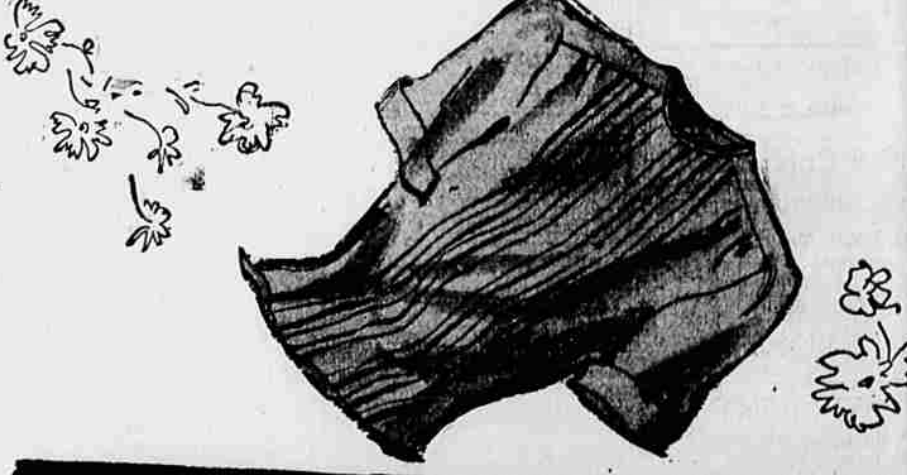
