

Stassen Injects Sour Note Over GOP Choice

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—E. Stassen sounded a dissenting note today in Republican ranks for the GOP national committee's choice of Rep. Carver of Tennessee as the new chairman.

a veteran of nearly 25 years of congressional service, told delegates at a victory dinner last night he realizes the national chairman "cannot make the republican party or determine its destinies."

That was the same point made by Stassen, who said he did not believe Reece's selection "constitutes a declaration by the republican party as to its policy or platform."

Stassen said significantly he was prepared to cooperate with Reece in this year's congressional elections. He did not go further than that.

Disapproves
"Of course," Stassen said, "it is well known that I do not approve of Chairman Reece's stand on many issues in the past."

The former Minnesota governor declined to amplify his remarks, but it was apparent he considers Reece's congressional record on international issues open to question.

Reece's forces, headed by Walter Hallahan, West Virginia committee man, defeated former Senator John A. Danaher of Connecticut, generally regarded as the choice of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

Danaher and John W. Hanes, a North Carolina democrat-turned-republican, at one point on the second ballot polled between them a total of 53 votes, enough for election had it been annulled by one individual.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 2 (AP)—A primeval forest area of 640 acres containing virgin cedar stands has been set aside for preservation on the muddy fork of the Lewis river 20 miles above Cougar, Wash., the forest service announced today.

Thornton T. Munger, chief of the forest management research office, said the tract is one of 13 to be preserved in its virgin state. He said the tract on the muddy fork contained many specimens of this "fast disappearing tree."

Pilot Butte Inn Purchased

BEND, April 2 (AP)—Sale of the Pilot Butte Inn and other properties of the Brooks estate here to Albert Gentner, Portland attorney and hotel operator, was announced today by Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Wood.

The price involved was not reported, but an appraisal of the historic Bend hotel two years ago set the value at \$327,000 when the properties were willed to Mr. and Mrs. Lester Brooks, Portland.

The Pilot Butte Inn, linked with the history of the city since its founding, and the adjacent Colonial Inn represented one of the largest realty sales in the city's history. The property was acquired by Philip R. Brooks in 1917 and left to Mrs. Brooks when her son died in 1942. Mr. Wood has been a clerk in the hotel for 25 years.

Gentner announced the inn would be managed by Harry Waldron, Longview, Wash.

Strikes About Over; Belief

SPOKANE, April 2 (AP)—Van A. Bittner, Pittsburgh, assistant to CIO President Philip Murray, said here last night "the industrial battles are about over. Only 50,000 steel workers are still out on strike and they will be back in ten days or two weeks."

"We have just finished the greatest strike in history," he added, "we had 745,000 workers out on strike without a single untoward incident. We proved to America that there is only one way to win a strike—stop production. If you stop production, there is no need of further demonstrations of any kind."

"Strikes are a good omen," Bittner said. "There are no strikes during hard times. Strikes spell prosperity."

SAN FRANCISCO, April 2 (AP)—The California Oregon Power company has filed an application with the federal power commission for a license to build a power plant on the North Umpqua river at Tokete Falls, the company reported today.

President Albert S. Cummings indicated an increased demand for power. He said the company's earnings declined from \$2.20 a common share in 1944 to \$1.82 in 1945.

Couple Nabbed On Bond Fraud

CHICAGO, April 2 (AP)—A man and woman, identified by secret service agents as Mrs. Lillian Snyder, 32, of Indianapolis, and Alexander J. Ori, 34, formerly of Massena, N. Y., were arraigned Monday before U. S. Commissioner Edwin K. Walker on charges of illegal possession and passing of government securities.

Harry D. Anhier, agent in charge of secret service, said the couple fled from the Oregon Shipbuilding corporation in Portland, where they were employed, in March, 1945, with 58 blank war bonds valued at approximately \$15,000. He said Mrs. Snyder was employed as a typist in the bond sales booth at the plant.

The couple was arrested Sunday night by secret service agents after stop orders were placed on the bonds. Anhier said they had cashed \$2000 worth of bonds in this area.

The case was continued to April 4. Bond of \$2500 each was set.

Matrimony Skidding Faster Than Ever In Klamath Area

Matrimony in the Klamath area is skidding at a faster clip than ever before, courthouse records for the stormy month of March reveal. During the month only 29 couples decided to tie the knot, while 48 final divorce decrees were granted and 42 couples filed intention of severing the tie.

Of the 29 marriage licenses issued, 27 went to civilian couples, one to a soldier and one to a sailor, a strict reversal of the situation of several months ago when servicemen were accounting for a great majority of the licenses sold.

Average age of the grooms was just over 27 and of the brides just over 24.

On the other side of the picture, 29 wives petitioned for a divorce and 12 husbands took the initiative to seek a legal break-up. One girl requested an annulment on the grounds that she was under age when married.

One of the couples suing for divorce had been married since 1909, two since 1923, one since 1938 and three since 1929, but the majority of the marriages had lasted less than eight years. Seven of the separating couples were married in the past two years. The year 1940 was a particularly bad year, seven of the couples asking for divorce being married in that year. Nine of the complaints listed Reno as the place where the marriage took place.

Of the final decrees, 33 went to wives and only 15 to husbands.
