Bombed-Out Wimbledon Reopened

WIMBLEDON, England, April 3 (AP)—International tennis will be reborn this summer at Wimbledon, where the famous stadium still bears the scars of bombing.

An All-England Tennis club official said interest in the revival of the Wimbledon championships after a seven-year wartime lapse, was "simply terrific."

It was the All-England club, originally a croquet organization, which sponsored the world's first international lawn tennis matches at Wimbledon 70 years ago, and this group has been staging annual championships here ever since except for interruptions during World Wars 1 and 2.

A bomb wiped out 1200 of the 10,000 seats surrounding the central court at Wimbledon several years ago. England is too busy rebuilding blitzed homes to restore sports plants so the damage will not be repaired for the 1946 championships. Instead, a railing is being placed around the wrecked portion of the stadium.

Nation's Best Gather For Master's Meet At Augusta

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 3 (AP)—A select field of the nation's best golfers teed off for a final practice round here today before starting the tenth \$10,000 master's tournament here tomorrow.

The 72-hole event, not held since 1942, brings the professionals' current winter tour to a close and pits the game's most able contenders against each other over the tough 6800-yard National Golf club layout.

Interest settles primarily on the impending duel between Ben Hogan of Hershey, Pa., and his fellow ex-Texan, Byron Nelson of Toledo. Nelson is the defending champion and one of the tournament's two double-winners and while Hogan has never beaten him here, the little Hershey pro is rated the favorite.

Hogan, the year's leading money winner, has consistently outplayed Nelson during the past two months and beat him in an exhibition match at Atlanta Sunday. They tied here in 1942 with 280, but Nelson won the playoff, 69 to 70, after Hogan had taken a three-stroke lead on the first five holes.

Angels Rise Into First With Seals

Los Angeles, with the compliments of Pitcher Red Lynn in his homecoming performance, shared the pedestal of the Pacific Coast Baseball league with the San Francisco Seals today.

Lynn, who won 21 games three years ago before going to the Chicago Cubs, allowed the Seattle Rainiers only three scattered hits in posting a 5-1 victory yesterday at Los Angeles.

The triumph matched the standing of three wins and one loss registered by San Francisco in its first defeat of the season at the hands of the San Diego Padres, 2 to 0, at San Diego. Oakland broke a ninth-inning deadlock at home to beat Portland, 3 to 2, while Sacramento entertained Hollywood with a 3-1 pasting.

The Los Angeles-Seals game was a no-hit duel for three and a half innings, but then the Angels' Bill Schuster touched Carl Fischer for a single and Eddie Sauer followed with a two-run homer. Los Angeles got seven safeties off four pitchers.

Lynn struck out eight. George McDonald, Bob Finley and Bill Matheson were the only Rainiers to connect with Lynn's offerings, the last two making their hits good for the score in the seventh inning.

Southpaw Al Olsen allowed the Seals eight hits in blanking them in their first defeat. The Padres opened up in the first frame after two were out. With the bases loaded, Catcher Len Rice banged out a single, scoring Dick Gyselman, who had singled, and Johnny Jensen, who had walked. Bill Werle, starting pitcher, was charged with the defeat.

Third Baseman Bill Hart of Oakland got the home fan plaudits with a single in the ninth inning which scored Mickey Burnett from second base and wrapped up the ball game. Tom Hafee, an outfielder last year, made his pitching debut for the Oaks, limiting Portland to seven hits. Roy Helsar yielded 10 safeties to the Oaks.

Pro Cage Meet In Semi-Finals

CHICAGO, April 3 (AP)—The world professional basketball championship tournament moves into the semi-final stage at Chicago stadium tonight, with the defending champion Fort Wayne, Ind., Zollners meeting the Baltimore, Md., Bullets, and the Chicago American Gears facing the Oshkosh All-Stars.

Winners will open a best two of three series Friday night for the championship, while the losers will start a similar series for third place. Games will be played on Friday and Saturday, and if necessary next Monday.

Although the American Gears appear vastly improved by the addition of George Mikan, De Paul university's six-foot, nine-inch center, the Fort Wayne club was rated favorite to cop the title it has won twice. The Gears finished third last year.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 3 (AP)—The New York Yankees of the new All-American Professional Football conference will do their 1946 training at Gonzaga university in Spokane, Coach Ray Flaherty said today.

The Spokane athletic round table announced that the Yankees would meet either the Brooklyn Dodgers or another league team in a preseason night game in Gonzaga Stadium August 31. The Dodgers have been investigating training facilities at Longview, Wash.

Flaherty, former coach of the Washington Redskins of the National Football league, said he would bring 50 players to Spokane, including Frankie Sinkwich, Ace Parker, Steve Lach, Bob Sweiger and Eddie Prokop. "I have the best material I've ever had," Flaherty said. "We should have a great team next season."
