The next meeting will be at 8 o'clock with Stella Dryden and Vera Reeves, hostesses.

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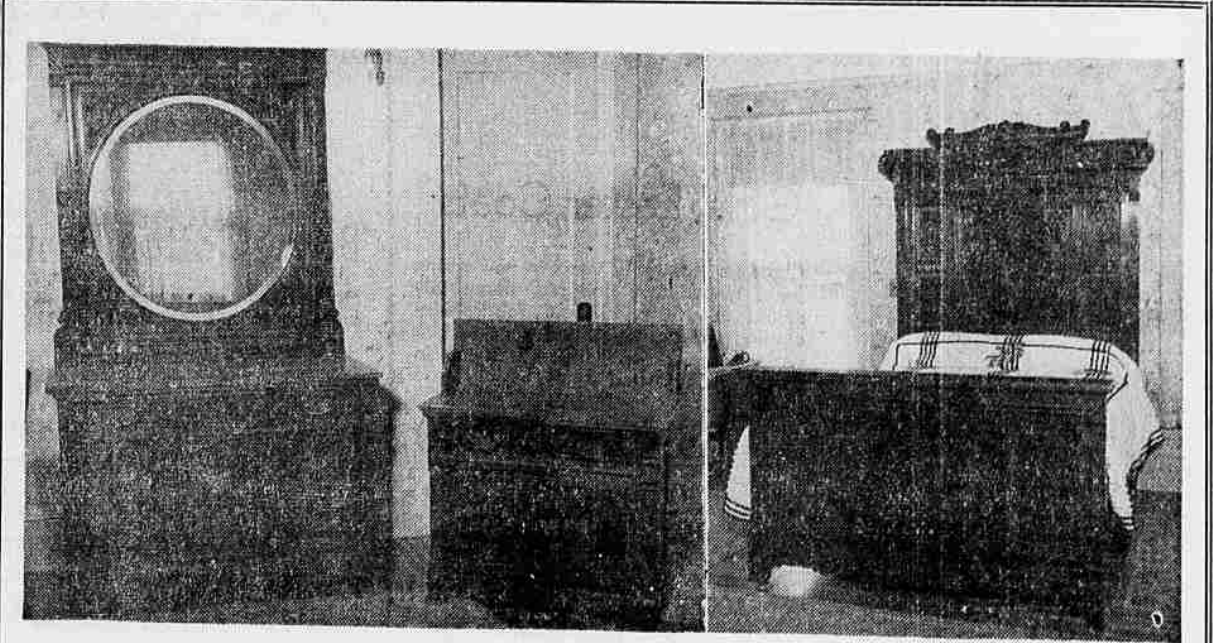
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
