

# \$16,280.23 Subscribed In Red Cross Campaign

Still short of reaching its \$43,100 quota, the Red Cross drive in Klamath county has chalked up a total of \$16,280.23 to date.

Outlying communities in the county which have turned in reports are Chiloquin, Malin, Bonanza, Modoc Point and Rocky Point. All five have gone over their quotas. Chiloquin has exceeded its quota of \$300

by an additional \$332.90, Malin has gone over its goal of \$500 by \$419.18, and Bonanza has gone over its \$150 goal by \$31.75. Other smaller districts in the county have not reported yet.

New members of the \$100 club are The Herald and News and KFLW, \$200; and the Herald and News employees, \$178.

A letter was received today at Red Cross headquarters from Mrs. D. F. Menefree, wife of Maj. Menefree of Crescent Lake. In her letter she stated: "The major will never forget the milk with which the Red Cross met him on his arrival from Japan last January. We both have always felt we could not have a more excellent organization than the Red Cross to administer relief and allied services."

## Drastic Bread Action Talked

LONDON, April 4 (AP)—Herbert Hoover, winding up his investigation of the European food situation, was scheduled today to sit in on a 17-nation emergency food conference which yesterday heard a delegate propose to make Europe's black bread even blacker to avert breadless days.

Sean Lemass, Eire's minister of commerce, proposed that the extraction rate in flour milling be raised to 90 per cent—as compared to the current rate of 72 to 85 per cent—in order to conserve dwindling wheat supplies.

Thomas C. Blaisdell Jr., chief of the U. S. economic mission to Europe, told the conferees the United States hoped to cut its domestic consumption of wheat by 40 per cent through "voluntary action" to aid hungry Europeans.

## Supply Of Butter Drops In Portland

PORTLAND, April 4 (AP)—The butter supply was still declining here today.

The Interstate Associated Creameries reported it would be unable to provide any butter after two more weeks unless the supply increases.

The small remaining stocks in private hands were being doled out to merchants on a quota basis.

## Governor Asks Aid Of Unions

SEATTLE, April 4 (AP)—With ships being tied up in Alaska ports, and some sailing unloaded, Alaska's Governor Gruening has asked the striking unions for help.

The governor yesterday appealed to the northwest representative of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union (CIO) for postponement of the longshoremen's strike. He was advised that the action of the Pacific coast locals had "no bearing" on the Alaska situation.

Gruening was told the strike was "job action" to enforce payment of legal wages under government orders and contract agreement.

Meanwhile, at Juneau, a longshoremen's strike has delayed the unloading of three vessels, and one, the North Sea, sailed for Sitka with 550 tons of Juneau-bound freight, mostly perishables, still aboard.

The ship is due back Friday on its southbound trip and will unload if the strike is settled. The longshoremen have demanded \$1.72 1/2 per hour, with \$2.59 hourly for overtime work.

## Group Approves Housing Measure

WASHINGTON, April 4 (AP)—Long range housing legislation, aimed at a goal of 12,500,000 new homes in the next 10 years, was approved unanimously today by the senate banking committee.

It provides easier government loans and credits designed to encourage construction by private industry and calls for continued direct government aid for low rent housing.

The long range plan is independent of the emergency legislation to provide homes for veterans.

Chairman Wagner (D-N.Y.) announced the committee, by a 7 to 4 vote, modified a provision demanded by the AFL and the CIO.

This was a clause requiring that "the wages or fees prevailing in the locality" must be paid on any construction done

with the aid of government loans.

It was made inapplicable to individual FHA-financed homes, but was left insofar as public and large scale housing construction is concerned.

## 300 Bid Adieu To Noah Beery

GLENDALE, Calif., April 4 (AP)—Old friends of stage and screen attended final rites today for Noah Beery, 64, veteran actor, who died Monday.

Three hundred persons, including his brothers, Wallace and William; his son, Noah Jr., and his widow, Marguerite, attended the services in the Wee Kirk of the Heather in Forest Lawn Memorial park. The Rev. H. R. Shaffer, pastor of Grandview Community Presbyterian church, officiated.

Among old friends present were William S. Hart, William Farnum, Blanche Ring, Roy Atwell, Leon Erroll and Charles Irwin.

## No Pact Reached In Dock Strike

PORTLAND, Ore., April 4 (AP)—Settlement of the checkers' walkout which has idled 225 longshoremen and halted unloading of two ammunition ships at the Beaver docks was left up to Seattle port of embarkation today.

The Waterfront Employers association here said it would not consider the CIO checkers' demand for higher pay because the work was under army direction. The eight checkers seek additional wages pay for handling explosives.

## Cheap Power Rates Urged

WASHINGTON, April 4 (AP)—Low-cost water, low-cost power must go hand-in-hand in development of the west, Reclamation Commissioner Michael Straus said today.

If power rates from reclamation projects are "pushed unduly out of line"—the irrigation features of the projects will suffer, he warned.

Testifying before the house irrigation and reclamation committee on a bill to fix the reclamation bureau's policy for repayment of the cost of power features of projects, Straus stated:

"If reclamation power rates are to be forced up there will be less incentive to develop river basins. Our power would not have a market at higher rates and we could not then develop large-scale and expensive irrigation projects without substantial direct cash outlays from the federal treasury.

Straus asserted that Judge Clifford H. Stone, chairman of the Colorado Water Conservation board, had testified previously before the committee, in effect, that "the farmer cannot have cheap power and cheap water at the same time."

"I challenge that statement," the reclamation commissioner declared.

"I can say that low cost water and low-cost power are the indivisible twins that make the multiple-purpose project feasible. I say, further, that, in the years to come, large portions of the west will be denied new
