KF Girl In Co-Ed Band

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, April 4—Jean Masten, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Masten of Klamath Falls, plays in the alto saxophone section of the college co-ed band, which is preparing its spring concert program. This band is the first to be organized in any institution of higher learning in the United States. Delbert Moore, bandmaster, organized the group in 1937 with less than 20 women. This year the enrollment has risen to nearly 50 members.

The band meets twice a week and grants a student one academic credit. Most of the band members have had previous experience in high school bands, reports Professor Moore. More expensive instruments such as the French horn, the oboe and bassoon are furnished by the college.

Supported by the educational fund, the band presents two to three free concert programs every year besides playing for special occasions.

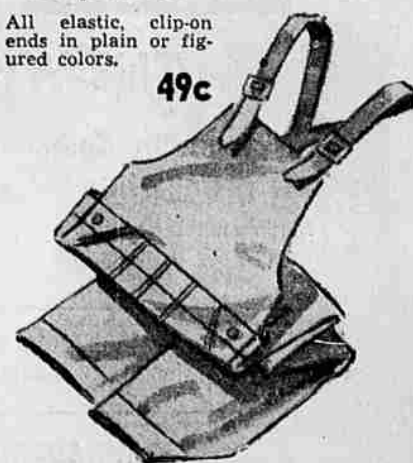
