Returned KF Doctor Finds Office Space Here Scarce

The scarcity of downtown office space is about equal to the scarcity of dwelling facilities in Klamath Falls, Dr. J. Martin Adams found upon his return from service.

Dr. Adams, 801 Roseway drive, Klamath Falls physician and surgeon, returned to his home town in September, 1945, after more than five years of service with the armed forces as flight surgeon, to find no office space available.

Dr. Adams went to Chicago for special schooling and returned to find still no accommodations available. For the past six weeks he has been in Susanville, Calif., relieving Dr. William Crever, who has been ill. He returned last weekend to find office locations as scarce as ever in this city.

Negotiations have been underway for some time to obtain an office in the Medical Dental building. Several dates have been set for opening this office and have been postponed for various reasons, including remodeling delays. The latest information Dr. Adams has received is that he may occupy the office April 15, nearly eight months after his release from the service.

Snag Falling Tests Slated

SALEM, April 4 (AP)—The state forestry department announced today it will conduct experiments in snag falling and slash burning by using the 84 barrels of "goop" it obtained from the government.

The material is a plastic explosive developed during the war. It is half magnesium metal, the rest being petroleum, asphalt and kerosene.

The experiments will be carried out in all sections of the state.

State Forester N. S. Rogers said it is hoped that by use of the explosive, it will be possible to burn slashings in wet weather, thus reducing fire hazards.

Cargo Of Lumber Shipped By Plane

PORTLAND, April 4 (AP)—A cargo of finished lumber was being shipped by air transport from Portland to Galveston, Tex., today, the Long-Bell Lumber company, Longview, Wash., announced.

The cargo is believed the first commercial shipment of lumber flown in the United States and will be handled by the National Skyways' Flying Tiger line. The lumber is finished paneling for interior use and weighs 2½ tons. It will be auctioned off at a Texas lumbermen's convention.
