

# Oregon Food Goal Set By Relief Body

Plans were laid for organization of the Klamath county food for famine relief committee at a meeting yesterday of the USDA county council and a few interested citizens. The plans called for a general meeting to be held at the chamber of commerce on Thursday, April 11, at 1:30 p. m., of representatives from all service clubs, educational groups, food processors and distributors, bakers, public eating establishments, and representatives of consumers groups.

At this meeting a permanent chairman and secretary will be elected and sub-committees will be set up to put into action all possible methods of wheat and fat conservation.

The world food situation, as outlined by C. A. H. county food for famine relief committee at a meeting yesterday of the USDA county council and a few interested citizens, is serious, and is getting worse for approximately 350 million people in liberated and defeated nations.

The Oregon food for famine relief committee has set food conservation goals for the state of 20,000 tons of wheat and 500 tons of fats and oils to be saved by July 1. Headed by Joseph K. Carson of Portland and composed of 100 state leaders of citizen's groups, the committee is asking every Oregonian "to eat less wheat products and fats and eliminate waste so that others might live."

The state goals represent about one per cent of the amounts needed to be saved nationally to fill this nation's promises to famine-stricken countries. Unless these commitments are kept, the committee reports, millions of people in war-devastated lands face death by starvation before they can harvest their crops for this year.

**Establish Goals**  
County food for famine relief committees now being set up in each county will establish county conservation goals in proportion to the state goals, which call for over-all reductions of 40 per cent in purchases and use of wheat products and 20 per cent in food fats and oils.

In terms of the individual, attaining the goals will mean that each man, woman and school child in the state will need to save the equivalent of three slices of bread and one teaspoon of fats and oils a day. Home savings recommended by the committee include preventing bread waste, substituting potatoes for bread and oatmeal for wheat cereals, using fruit for desserts instead of pies, cakes and cookies, serving fewer fried foods and re-using fats and oils.

Conservation measures for bakeries, public eating places, food distributors and food processors are being worked out by sub-committees representing each trade group.

## Four-H News

## Potato Cellar Refuse Dumps Aid In Controlling Disease

Three county potato cull and cellar refuse dumps are contributing materially to the control of potato nematode, ring rot and other diseases, according to Harold Schieferstein, county weed and pest control inspector.

The dumps, located north of Malin, southwest of Merrill and in the old abandoned gravel pit on the hill road near the Lost river diversion dam were set aside by the county court specifically for agricultural refuse. The dumps were established in 1941 and since that time have been used extensively for disposal of eel worm infested potatoes and cellar cleanings.

**Minute Worm**  
Eel worm or potato nematode is a minute worm which causes potatoes to have a rough, warty appearance. The worm cannot be seen with the naked eye. When potatoes are planted on land infested with nematode, the nematode enters the roots and gets into the tubers. Nematode is seldom found deeper than a quarter-inch under the surface of a potato. When a warty potato is peeled the worm can be seen as a small white center in somewhat larger brownish islands.

As storage progresses each worm turns into an egg-producing organism which appears somewhat pear shaped under a microscope. When the skin of a potato is broken, 200 or 300 small eggs spill out.

Potato growers here are particularly careful not to plant potato seed infested with eel worm. Once the worm infestation is established in a soil it is almost impossible to eradicate it. The nematode will survive on most crop and weed roots. It does not live on grain roots.

Experiments carried here have shown that good clean summer fallow and weed free grain fields will materially cut eel worm populations. Some of the newer agricultural chemicals used as soil fumigants show promise as eradicators.

## Seed Payment To Be Offered

Because of the critical shortage of alfalfa, red clover and alsike seeds, special poundage payments will be offered to encourage increased harvesting of these seed crops in 1946. Burrell Short, chairman of the county AAA committee, announced today.

He advised county producers that payments will be computed on a clean seed basis on seed harvested and sold into commercial channels before January 1, 1947. Rates of payment are 7 cents a pound on alfalfa and alsike clover seed, and 9 cents a pound on red clover. He pointed out that these 1946 rates are considerably higher than

**Suitable Spray**  
Another suitable spray can be made up by using 1 pint of 40 per cent formaldehyde in 15 gallons of water. Formaldehyde evaporates rapidly and is hard to use in cellars or confined places.

A third cellar spray is provided by making up a solution of 1 pound of copper sulfate to 10 gallons of water.

Any of these sprays are suitable for destroying bacteria and fungus that cause rot in storage. The mercuric chloride spray is perhaps somewhat better and easier to use than the other two. Cellars equipment and bags should be thoroughly soaked.

the 21 cent and 31 cent rates for similar payments in 1945.

Oregon's 1946 production goals for these three seed crops call for 10,000 acres of alfalfa seed, an increase of 43 per cent; 20,000 acres of red clover seed, an increase of 54 per cent, and 30,000 acres of alsike clover seed, an increase of 300 per cent.

In addition to the poundage payment, Short said, acreage payments of \$3.50 an acre up to \$35 per farm are offered for harvesting red clover, alfalfa and alsike seed. This added payment should half get harvest machinery moved into smaller fields.

He also reminded that producers who have not filed a 1946 farm plan will need to do so before May 1 if they intend to take part in the 1946 agricultural conservation program.

**Farm Construction Will Be Reviewed**  
Applications for farm construction under the civilian production administration's new construction limitation order will be received by county and state AAA committees. Short, chairman of the county AAA committee, has been notified.

Purpose of the order is to limit less-essential construction so that more materials will be available for building new homes for returning veterans. He has been informed that the order provides exemptions of \$400 for farm
