

U. S. Presses For Pacts With Five Axis Nations

WASHINGTON, April 6 (AP)—The United States, putting the American tempo into diplomacy, pressed today for a speed-up in final peace settlements with five of Germany's vanquished satellites.

Secretary of State Byrnes took the initiative in seeking an early end to the uncertainty which surrounds the futures of Italy, Finland, Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria — and which may be contributing to European unrest.

He appealed to the foreign ministers of Britain, France and Russia to join him in Paris April 25 for a special council meeting dedicated to resolving the major differences which still exist between the powers on the terms to be imposed on these axis allies.

Withheld Move

Apparently tired but obviously buoyed by his accomplishments at the United Nations security council, Byrnes withheld his new move until assured that the international slate would be wiped clean of the critical dispute over

Iran.

To Foreign Ministers Molotov of Russia, Bevin of Britain and Bidault of France, Byrnes bluntly wrote, "I have been much distressed at the slow progress made by the deputies' names six months ago to carry on the preliminary treaty-framing work in London."

The April 25 date which Byrnes proposed in his surprise appeal is five days prior to the scheduled Paris conference which is to bring together the 21 western allied powers to pass on peace pacts for the little axis nations.

But it has been accepted generally that such a meeting could or would accomplish little unless Britain, France, Russia and the United States first reach agreement among themselves upon the treaty terms to be submitted to the May 1 conference.

Delay Pushed

These doubts had reached the point where Russia was advocating postponement of the 21-member peace conference, with France suggesting, too, that a delay might be necessary.

Veteran foreign diplomats in Washington today questioned whether the Byrnes Paris conference proposal would succeed in averting postponement of the Moscow party, but they welcomed it as the first top-level attempt to end the disagreements delaying the treaties.

Thus far, Byrnes has received no replies to his proposal. The state department said, however, that the message, dated April 4, had only just reached the other three capitals. The fact that it was made public before answers arrived carried some significance, for it would have the effect of drawing international public attention to the American move.

Church Group Sends Clothing Overseas

The Dorcas society of Seventh Day Adventist church, with a membership of 40 women, has during the past three months sent overseas 760 garments and five new quilts, filling six barrels for European relief.

These energetic women under the leadership of Mrs. Van Tess now have 640 garments cleaned and repaired and five more new quilts which they have pieced, ready to ship. This material will fill another five barrels for shipping, making a total of 1400 garments and 10 quilts, 11 barrels full in all, supplied by the group.

This is only one of the activities of the Dorcas society, Mrs. F. L. Chitwood, member, reported.

2 Students To Get U. N. Trip

PORTLAND, April 6 (AP)—The 62 delegates attending the northwest college congress entered second-day sessions today, spurred by the announcement that two of them will get trips to the United Nations conference this summer.

One student from schools of 1000 or more enrollment and one from schools of less than 1000 will be chosen on the basis of their success in reporting on the conference to their own campuses. Radio station KGW and the Portland League of Women Voters are sponsoring the United Nations trip.

OLYMPIA, April 6 (AP)—Fire gutted the Pacific highway transport warehouse here this morning, and Agent Ray Badham said damage might run to several thousand dollars.

A large stock of freight in the 100 by 125 foot structure appeared to be totally destroyed. All rolling stock was saved. Badham said freight was insured and he believed the building was too.

He said the structure "at one time" was worth \$100,000, and freight on the docks when fire broke out at 5 a. m., just after unloading had been completed, "probably was worth twice that much."

Cause of the blaze was not determined immediately.
