

Safety Plan To Be Started

A long-range plan to bring the need for safety on the job and off home to railroad workers will be inaugurated in Klamath Falls tonight, Tuesday, in a meeting for SP employees and their families in KC hall at 7 o'clock.

The plan is to cut away from the dry figures and statistical blood split generally associated with safety meetings, and make the families of railroad men conscious of the dangers of the breadwinners' jobs.

The families would then take an interest in making sure the worker takes the precautions

necessary in dangerous jobs, C. F. Woodworth, SP safety supervisor, believes.

Instead of a statistical approach to safety-consciousness, Woodworth plans to make tonight's meeting a community affair, movies, cartoons, lunch and audience participation in discussions of safety problems.

This new slant on the railroad's old problem is getting its first test here and if successful Woodworth believes it will spread to other roads and other parts of the country.

In addition to immediate betterment of safety conditions on railroad jobs, Woodworth also thinks this method of getting at the problem will bring about better, more alert railroad workers in the future by having youngsters of railroad men become conscious of the need for safety now.
