

President Denies Kimmel Appeal To Bare FDR File

WASHINGTON, April 11 (AP)—President Truman today denied an appeal by Senator Fergusson to make public the files of President Roosevelt.

John Phelan, representing the former Pacific fleet commander, told a senate committee that he had been given access to the file, which had been set up in 1941, to investigate the alleged attack on the Japanese attack at Pearl Harbor.

Phelan said that when the file was searched, it contained only two messages, one of which was addressed to the high commissioner of the Philippines and had little bearing on the Japanese attack at Pearl Harbor.

He has contended before the congressional committee that Washington did not fully warn him about the attack on a Japanese at

operations, about prewar arrangements with Japan to permit safe passage of an American vessel, carrying marines and other Americans from north China to Manila.

Fergusson said he thought the arrangements had been undertaken in the first week in December in anticipation by both countries that war would break out soon.

Stark replied that as far as the United States was concerned it thought war was coming but didn't know when.

Strike Slated At Canneries

SEATTLE, April 11 (AP)—Alaska salmon cannery workers, charging that contract negotiations have gone down, made plans today to strike Easter Sunday, April 21.

The Cannery Workers and Farm Laborers union local 7 here and six food, tobacco, agricultural and allied workers' union locals in Alaska, all CIO-affiliated, announcing the strike, said in a formal statement:

"Negotiations came to a halt when Walter Fuhrer, representing the industry, flatly stated the industry refused to negotiate on any of the union's demands. Their original offer of a 9 per cent increase, made on a take-it-or-leave-it basis, amounts to a rise of only 4 per cent per hour in our lowest category."

The unions said the Alaska Salmon Industry, Inc., "must accept full responsibility for this strike action."

Car Liability System Sought

SALEM, April 11 (AP)—A preliminary initiative petition to set up a state-operated compulsory automobile liability insurance system was filed with Secretary of State Robert S. Farrel today by W. H. Downing, Adrian Smith and W. E. Richardson, all of Portland.

The measure, which would be on the November general election ballot if the required number of signatures is obtained, replaces one filed several weeks ago. The original measure was withdrawn when the sponsors learned it was defective.

The new measure, which would take effect next January 1, provides that every motor vehicle owner would pay \$25 a year for the insurance, which would be administered by Farrell. The insurance provided would be \$5000 for each person injured in an accident with a total bodily injury liability of \$10,000 for each accident, and property damage liability of \$5000 for each accident. The insurance rate would drop \$3 a year if the owner had no accidents.
