

Senate Shunts Housing Measure Back To House

WASHINGTON, April 11 (AP)—The senate shunted the emergency housing bill back to the house today and quickly turned to a companion measure intended to add 12,500,000 new homes by 1956.

This long-range bill came to the senate's floor with the unanimous approval of its banking committee. Bi-partisan backing is demonstrated by its trio of authors: Senators Wagner (D-N.Y.), Taft (R-Ohio) and Ellender (D-La.).

The bill is not linked to but fits in with the emergency housing legislation which the senate passed yesterday, 63 to 14, and

sent back to the house for action on amendments.

The emergency bill is designed to provide 2,700,000 new dwelling units, largely for veterans, by the end of next year.

Before it can reach President Truman for signature, however, the senate and house must agree on a compromise version to be worked out by a senate-house committee.

The chief point of difference is the senate provision for \$600,000,000 in subsidies to encourage the output of scarce building materials.

The house refused to permit these premium payments, and both branches turned thumbs down on price ceilings for existing dwellings. The administration, from Mr. Truman down, had urged both these features. Ceilings on new houses were provided by the house and the senate alike.

Encourages Building

The long-range bill makes no attempt to settle urgent housing problems. It takes things slower, and is based on the idea that easier government loans and mortgage guarantees might encourage more construction by private enterprise.

There are, in addition, provisions for continued federal aid for public, low-rent developments, home loans to farmers and federal aid to cities which want to redevelop blighted areas.

One feature would permit the purchase of a home (insured by the federal housing authority) with only a 5 per cent down payment. On a \$5000 house this would be \$250. The purchaser would have 32 years to pay the balance.

The legislation provides for direct federal expenditures of about \$30,000,000 the first year with a rise to \$133,000,000 a year after five years.

School Teachers May Count Other Service

SALEM, April 11 (AP)—Attorney General George Neuner ruled today that certified school teachers who had previous service with other state agencies may count that previous service toward their retirement benefits.

He also ruled that a teacher must work at least 600 hours a year for any one district before coming under the system. He said that a teacher who works more than 600 hours a year for two districts, but not that long for either one of them, is not eligible. The opinion was for the state public employees retirement system.

Silver Bars Removed From Aluminum Plant

TROUTDALE, Ore., April 11 (AP)—Silver bars valued at \$21,000,000 were being removed today from the war built aluminum plant where workmen are laboring with U. S. treasury guards standing nearby.

The precious metal was installed on loan from the treasury when war shortages prevented use of copper for electrical conductors.

Even the splinters, shavings and dust caused in cutting the bars for shipment will be returned to the treasury. The metal totals 2000 tons.

KOIN Sold To Chicago Firm

PORTLAND, April 11 (AP)—Formal sale of radio station KOIN, Portland, to Marshall Field Enterprises, Inc., Chicago, was completed today with acceptance by C. W. Myers, former KOIN president, of checks totaling \$1,045,000.

This was the Chicago publisher and radio station owner's first entry into the west coast broadcasting field. He owns stations at Chicago and Cincinnati and publishes newspapers in Chicago and New York.

Howard Lane, director of broadcasting for the Field firm, announced no changes in management were contemplated. Myers will remain in an advisory capacity for three years.

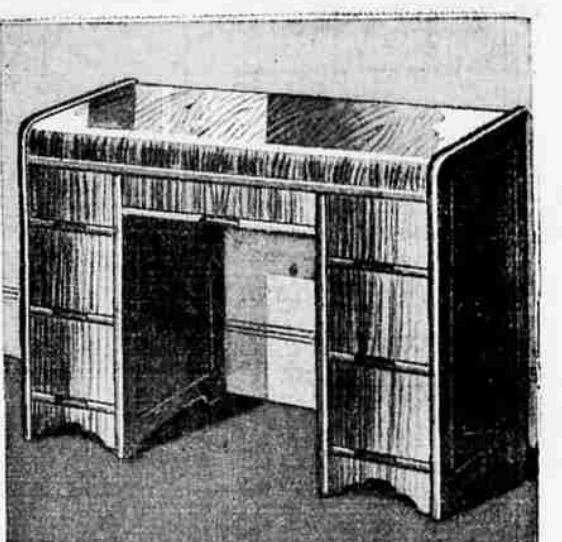

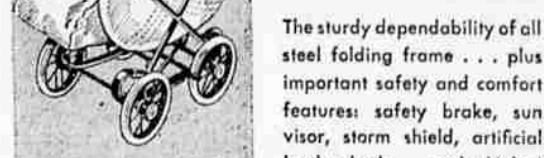

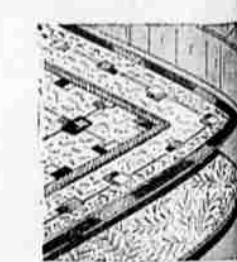
