MANILA, April 11 (AP)—Government forestry experts estimated today that the Philippines require 4,500,000,000 board feet of lumber for reconstruction.

At the rate the islands' 62 sawmills are producing, it would take 30 years to fill the requirements.

Lumber now sells for as high as \$300 a thousand board feet.
