Sunday will be marked by special services in all local churches and religious observances have been arranged through Holy Week.

The churches' youth are joining together to make a special service at the Easter service on a hill to be held at the Pacific Terrace. Details of the program will be announced next week.

The feature of Holy Week is the daily noon program by the Klamath Falls religious association to be held at the Pelican theatre starting Sunday.

Palm Sunday program, N. Baptist church, N. and High, will include a solo by Mrs. Stanley and a piano solo by Ernest Armstrong.

"Coming King," will be the title of the service at the church of St. Andrew's. The service will be held at 10 o'clock with the choir singing the Easter hymns. The evening service will be at 7 o'clock with the choir singing the Easter hymns.

The CIO Superchargers and Checkers Local, which rejected an arbitration award in favor of the operators, asked that conferences be resumed. Business Agent W. H. Hanks said the union would observe the working contract now in effect until a new agreement is reached.

R. E. Ferguson, waterfront employers' manager, said the negotiations would start tomorrow if the board agrees.
