

Food For Famine Relief Program Under Way Here

Produce and save! This will be the slogan of the Klamath Famine Relief which met Thursday afternoon at the chamber of commerce to organize various organizations, units, producers and consumers.

A. H. Bussman, Klamath Falls businessman, was named chairman of the Food For Famine group. Heads of committees were also named, these chairmen to name their own workers. Appointed were Ted Reeves, wholesaler; Roy Eastman, retail grocer; Dr. J. C. Hunt, butchers and slaughterers; Fred Hoagland, bakers; Mrs. Avis McConnell, restaurants; Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen, education; Mrs. Paul O. Landry, city schools; Mrs. Isabelle Brixner, county schools.

Bert Hall served as temporary chairman at the first meeting yesterday afternoon. He called on C. A. Henderson, Klamath county agricultural agent, to explain the world situation which has made it necessary for the organization of Food For Famine Relief.

Starvation Near

Henderson said that the number of persons in "acute danger of starvation" was alarming and that it looked like a three-year program of assistance from those countries which are crop producing and not harmed by the war. Henderson said that nature should have given a bountiful crop year this season but instead drought faces the African wheat belt as well as the wheat growing areas of the Ukraine. Thirteen million tons of wheat, of which five million are sought from the United States, is needed this year alone.

"There are two phases which we must consider in this Food For Famine Relief program," Henderson advised. "The first is to increase agricultural production as much as possible and to save through farms, the other is to grow Victory gardens for individual family consumption."

Consumers, especially the housewives were appealed to to save all fats and oils and to take care that not a single slice of bread was wasted. Wheat growers were urged to send all possible wheat now in storage into the commercial channel.

Bussman will call another meeting of this committee this coming week.

Operation Blessed Event Successful

SAN FRANCISCO, April 12 (AP)—The navy transport Rutland's "operation blessed event" has been successful.

The vessel steamed into harbor yesterday with a huge white stork painted on the smokestack, honoring tiny marine Rose Wells, daughter of Marie and Clayton H. Wells, discharged navy man from Everett, Wash. She was born April 2, two days before the ship docked at Pearl Harbor.

TOKYO, April 12 (AP)—Twelve Americans, former prisoners of war, were named today as victims in war-crimes charges filed against three former Japanese guards at Fukuoka camp.

Yoshiyuki Ikeda, Tadashi (Scarface) Takana and Yoshige Yagi are accused of beating the prisoners with sticks, clubs, sabers, chains, iron bars and pokers.
