

325,000 Japanese Said Remaining in Indonesia

LONDON, April 13 (AP)—Dr. Hubertus J. Van Mook, acting governor general of the Dutch East Indies, said today 325,000 Japanese were still in Indonesia—290,000 under allied control and the rest "somewhere in the interior of Java."

Van Mook declined to predict when the withdrawal of British troops from Indonesia, announced last night, would be completed. Dutch forces are to replace the British units in gradual transfers.

The announcement was made in a British communique following a conference attended by the British and Dutch prime ministers and foreign secretaries.

Group Seeks Vanport Funds

PORTLAND, April 13 (AP)—The job of finding \$500,000 a year to finance schools, hospital and recreational facilities at Vanport was in the hands of a sub-committee on temporary housing today.

Mayor Riley's housing committee turned the problem over to the smaller group after Seattle officials of the federal public housing authority reported no funds were available.

Declaring that Vanport is "no longer war housing but community housing," Francis A. Staten, deputy regional FHFA director in Seattle, said the project would be left in the community "only if it wants it."

Reds Use Jeeps To Chase Wolves

MOSCOW, April 13 (AP)—The Russians have adapted the jeep to another new use—wolf chasing.

A report from Bakinsky in the Baku area said that a pack of hungry wolves set upon a drove of horses in the Milky steppe near a collective farm recently.

A farmer named Dzharov, noticing the wolves, turned his jeep off the road and pursued the wolves across the steppes, whereupon Farmer Dzharov rounded up the horses and drove them home ahead of his jeep.

Smallpox Fatal To Eight Persons

SEATTLE, April 13 (AP)—City health authorities said yesterday 41 King county residents have become infected with smallpox and eight have died.

An elderly woman, already critically ill with a heart ailment, and a 17-year-old girl were reported to have contracted the disease yesterday.

One coach of a troop train en route east from Seattle was quarantined at St. Maries, Idaho, when a soldier appeared to have contracted smallpox. He was taken to a St. Maries hospital and his trouble diagnosed as chickenpox. The coach, however, remained in quarantine and the rest of the train went on.

Pappy's Ex-Wife Sues For Divorce

SEATTLE, April 13 (AP)—Married at Yakima less than a month ago, Mrs. Helene Marie Gilbert, ex-wife of the famed marine flyer, Gregory (Pappy) Boyington, today started suit to divorce George Lewis Gilbert, Seattle newsdealer. She charged him with mental cruelty, and asked restoration of the name Boyington.

Dixie Senators Play OPA Action

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—Chairman Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) of the senate agriculture committee said today that if any extension of OPA is granted beyond July 1 he will offer legislation "to remove all controls on farm commodities."

His announcement coincided with a call by Senator Bankhead (D-Ala.) for a meeting of cotton state senators Monday. Bankhead said they would consider Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles' action in issuing the cotton exchange directives "which are greatly depressing the price of cotton."

Thomas said that "Bowles and the OPA's illegal order in demanding excessive cotton margins was intended to destroy a free cotton market for the farmers and drive the price of cotton down."

"This was demonstrated yesterday on the New York cotton exchange when the price of cotton broke \$5 per bale without any reason."

Conservatives Win Jap Vote

TOKYO, April 13 (AP)—Virtually final, unofficial returns from Japan's general election emphasized tonight that a heavy conservative bloc would dominate the house of representatives which meets May 10 to consider a new constitution.

Meantime, Japanese were promised a lively fight between Premier Shidehara, who is determined to retain his cabinet until the constitution has been adopted, and Liberal Party Leader Iohiro Hatoyama, who wants to form a coalition government.

With only one seat of the 466-member house to be filled, newspaper figures gave the liberals—who actually are conservative—141 seats, a lead of 48 over their nearest rivals, the progressives, who also are conservative.

The progressive membership was reduced by tonight's figures to 93. With their total of 234 votes, the two parties hold a bare majority, but may get support from many of the 80 independents and some of the 92 social democrats elected. The latter has both right and left factions. Other seats went to minor parties 39, cooperatives 14 and communists five.

The ship, taking on lumber here, was scheduled to leave for Portland Sunday.

Oldtime Cattleman Claimed By Death

LAKEVIEW, April 13—Otho H. Dunham died at the home of his son, Marshall, early Wednesday morning following a heart attack on April 2 that developed into pneumonia. He came to Lakeview a month ago to make his home.

Otho Dunham was born at Jefferson City, Mo., on Sept. 12, 1854, and was almost 92 years old at the time of his death. He was an old time cattleman, having trailed cattle from Arkansas to Bozeman, Mont., and from there to Ft. Fetterman and down the Yellowstone river to "Buffalo Bill" Cody's ranch in Wyoming. Later he settled in Green River valley in Wyoming, going overland by covered wagon with his family. He owned a cattle ranch near Big Piney, Wyo., until his retirement in 1917. The body will be sent to Big Piney for burial.
