

Remnants Of German Spy Ring Seized

SHANGHAI, April 15 (AP)—Seven axis nationals whom U. S. investigators said were the remnants of a once-powerful Nazi spy network which continued to operate in the Orient four months after Germany's surrender were arrested today.

This culmination of months of intensive work by U. S. officers was one of the most important roundups of international figures yet conducted in the Far East. They included four Germans, two Italians and one Japanese.

Face Trial
All are charged with war crimes activities hostile to the United States. They presumably will be tried in China, although it was predicted earlier that they would be returned to Germany on the ship leaving June 15 with German repatriates. Investigators, however, said there were sufficient witnesses in China to testify against them.

An official statement said the men obtained information on Chinese and American troop, air and fleet movements by "breaking, buying and stealing secret codes and transmitting information to Tokyo via clandestine radio stations."

The spy ring, authorities declared, was cloaked by German commercial firms in China and was aided by the German embassy. The statement said espionage agents between VE and VJ Days aided the Japanese by supplying information on a planned nationalist drive in regard to Luichow peninsula of South China.

The group is charged with operating a bureau to infiltrate Nazi spies throughout China, Manchuria and Mongolia and to spot allied military movements by monitoring broadcasts and obtaining codes and ciphers.

Today Deadline For Filing Tax Returns

Red Cross Drive Lags

The Klamath county Red Cross quota of \$43,100 today lacked almost \$20,000 of that amount, and although the drive was slated to wind up by April 1, the outlook was far from encouraging this week that the full quota would be obtained for quite some time.

Total to date, as of Monday morning, was \$22,138.

Ivory Pine company at Bly, down since December 28, due to weather conditions, was resuming operations today it was announced by E. P. Ivory, operator.

Some 115 persons are employed at the mill in Bly and at the company's woods operations on the Kanott table land northwest of Beatty. Repairs and additions were made during the seasonal shut-down.

Gold Shipment Abroad Sought

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15 (AP)—Twenty gold mine operators from South Dakota, Colorado, Washington and California, meeting informally here over the weekend, sought today to formulate a program designed to persuade the U. S. treasury to reverse itself and permit the shipment of newly-mined gold abroad so that American producers can take advantage of the free world price.

Albert Knorp, secretary of the American Mining Congress, pointed out that gold is bringing prices in Egypt, Turkey, Chile and Brazil ranging from \$43 to \$120 an ounce but that the U. S. treasury pays a price of only \$35 an ounce and forces American producers to sell only to it. Nevertheless, Knorp said, about \$85,000,000 worth of gold was exported from the United States in 1944, primarily as fabricated gold used in art work.
