

# Assessment To Finance Tule Group

Acres assessment on various crops to finance the Tulelake Growers association work, including setting up a permanent labor camp, was agreed upon at a meeting of the association in Tulelake Monday night.

All growers eligible who were present at the Monday meeting signed up for the assessment, and association officials urged that others do so as rapidly as possible at the Tulelake Growers office in Tulelake.

The association has been attempting to get the army barracks at the WIA center at Tulelake to be used as a permanent labor camp. This deal has not been completed.

Representatives of the association who went to Sacramento last week for a meeting with the state department of agriculture reported that the regulations on certified seed will be approximately the same this year as last year in the Tulelake area. Proposed changes in the rules agreed upon at a meeting at Oregon State college at Corvallis some time ago have not been accepted for California, it was reported.

Under the established set-up, grades will be divided as follows:

- Blue tag grade, U. S. No. 1, including green ends.
- Blue tag crop seed.
- Red tag, including field run with defective spuds removed but U. S. No. 1 sizes left in.

All equipment must be sterilized before grading.

A telephone call from Switzerland, lasting six minutes, was received by Mrs. Ruth Schaeffer, 3311 Homedale, from her son, Sgt. Rex Morehouse, U. S. army, last week.

The first few seconds Morehouse's voice sounded blurred. Mrs. Schaeffer said, but after that it was very clear and natural. Sgt. Morehouse is on border patrol duty in Germany and was touring Switzerland on furlough when he made the call from Geneva.

Mrs. Schaeffer was notified by a telephone operator on a Saturday that the call would be through about 11 a. m. the following Tuesday. It finally came through at 12:15 p. m. Thursday and she took it at Miller's store where she is employed.

Morehouse seemed very interested to know what time it was here when he called. It was night time in Switzerland. He asked about schoolmates whom he had heard were home and said he expects to be home some time this summer.

He has been overseas since 1945 and entered the service in 1943. He was transferred from the air corps to the infantry shortly before he went overseas.

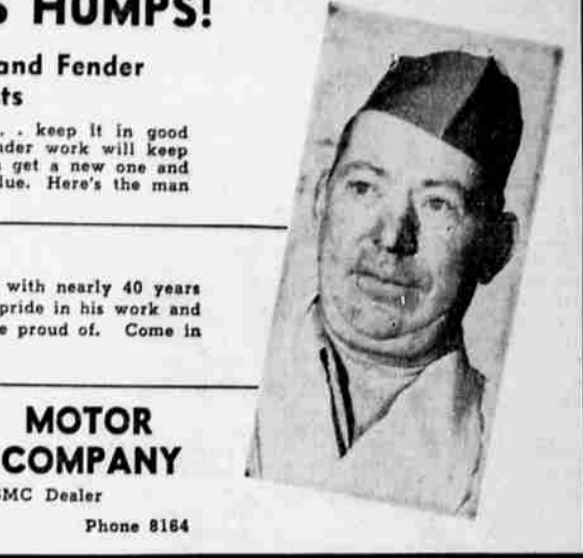
