

Police Alert As Crowds Stream Into Jerusalem To Watch Easter Rites

JERUSALEM, April 18 (AP)—Through streets lined with barbed wire barricades and teeming with armed troops, thousands streamed into this ancient city today to see Christian worshippers recreate with symbolic ceremonies the last hours before Christ was crucified.

An undercurrent of tension City as Palestine's three-cornered Arab-Jewish-British political controversy was complicated by a countrywide strike of 50,000 civil servants, who are demanding increased pay and better working conditions.

A three-hour walkout in sympathy with the strikers, was set for today by several thousand persons employed in special wartime departments of the Palestine government.

Remain Alert

Although so-called terrorist groups have been idle for the

past few days, there was no relaxation by authorities, who remained alert against any possible outbreak. Arab legionnaires, with automatic rifles slung over their shoulders, mingled with the colorfully garbed celebrants of the sacred rites of antiquity.

Easter observance of the western and eastern Christian faiths coincide this year, making the Holy Sepulchre site and other sacred places more crowded with worshippers than usual.

Ancient Rites

The ancient rites of Maundy Thursday began at daybreak and will continue all day as sect after sect stages its interpretation of the events of the day on which Christ led disciples into the "upper room" for the Last Supper.

There were virtually no American uniforms to be seen and only occasionally one of the other allies, who formerly had made Jerusalem a popular furlough spot.

Elaborate rites of commemoration were planned by the eastern sects of Christianity today, featuring much colorful pageantry and ancient symbolism, but the chapels in which the ceremonies were to be held were small and only a fraction of the throngs visiting the Holy City could witness them.

Army Offers Instruction

The new regular army offers many technical courses of instruction to young men joining now. It was announced by the local U. S. army recruiting service.

Each branch of the service maintains technical schools, the air force alone operating over 100. The air corps offers instruction in cooking, military police work, B-29 engineer course and P-80 (jet-propelled) airplane and engine maintenance.

The aircraft weight and balance course offers specialized training in principles and procedures for weighing planes, calculating load, loading and balancing and securing cargo, use of load adjusters and loading graphs and in the accomplishment of pertinent forms. Completion of this course qualifies a student to a T-4 grade in air transportation.

Detailed information on any course offered now is available at the army recruiting office, post office building.

Merchants Study Road Improvement

A study of the feasibility of improvements on the present north entrance highway route into Klamath Falls will be made by a special committee of the Klamath Merchants association, it was announced by association officials today.

Although the state highway department has acquired right-of-way for a new north entrance to Klamath Falls by Alameda street, there has been some agitation for improvements on the old north entrance which will function until the new job is done. The merchants committee will make a report which will determine whether the association will urge the improvements.

Petitions on file with the association show that a large majority of the property owners and lease holders on Main street are opposed to one-way traffic for that street. One-way traffic was recently proposed as a possibility for cross-town travel by state highway officials.
