Trout Regulations

General trout season will open throughout Oregon, except for Lake and Harney counties, and special exceptions for streams and lakes in various counties, on April 20, or tomorrow, and ends October 31.

The bag limit is the same as last year, 15 fish or 15 pounds and one fish in any one day, not to exceed 30 fish or 30 pounds and two fish in any seven consecutive days; length, six inches or over.

Special seasons on Klamath county waters are:

Klamath river—October 1 to July 5. Has been open all winter.

Seven Mile creek—Season closes September 30.

Lake o' the Woods—Season May 11 to November 30; limit 10 fish or 10 pounds and one fish any day, 20 fish or 20 pounds and two fish in any seven consecutive days.

Ocell lake—May 11 to October 31.

Crescent lake—May 11 to October 31.

Upper Klamath and Agency lakes—May 11 to October 31, with the provision that the portion of the upper lake from Modoc Point south to Link river is open the entire year.

Link river and Lake Ewauna—Open entire year.

Davis lake—May 30 to September 1; limit five fish but not over 15 pounds and one fish in any one day, and 10 fish, not to exceed 30 pounds and two fish in any seven consecutive days.

Lost river—July 1 to October 31. Lost river will be closed to all angling during May and June.

All other lakes in Klamath county open for trout May 11 and the season ends September 20.

Closed to all angling is that part of Klamath river 4000 feet below and 2000 feet above the mouth of Spencer creek, Spencer creek itself, Odell creek from the lake downstream to a line adjacent to the forestry camp and Link river from Copco dam downstream 200 feet.

The use of live minnows or bait fish in any waters of the Cascade range or in any trout lake or stream except those known to contain bass is illegal.

It is unlawful to use anything but an artificial fly in Davis lake and a portion of Deschutes river.

So much for the game commission's don'ts.

Among the more popular fishing streams opening tomorrow are both forks of the Sprague outside the reservation, Sycan river above the reservation, Wood river and Seven Mile creek coming into Agency lake, and the various streams coming into them, Sun creek and Annie creek out of Crater lake park.

Fellows around town who should know figure the best fishing is to be had above the lake at the beginning of the season but the water will probably be a little roily.

Big Season Seen Ahead For Lefties

With the major league baseball campaign only three days old today, it looked like the southpaw pitching brigade was set for its most productive season in 15 years.

Not since the early '30's when Lefty Grove, Carl Hubbell, Bill Walker, Herb Pennock, Lefty Gomez, Bill Hallahan, Larry French, Earl Whitehill and Babe Waberg handuffed the batters have so many good lefthanders blossomed out in one season.

With the return of such princely pitchers as Howie Pollet, Max Lanier, Johnny Vander Meer, Ken Heintzelman, Mickey Harris, Marius Russo and Clyde Shoun from the wars to join forces with holdovers Hal Newhouse, Thornton Lee, Mickey Haefner, Stubby Overmire and Harry Brecheen, it might well turn out that this first post-war year will be the greatest in baseball history for the lefthanded legion.

Southpaw Set
Three of the southpaw set, Pollet, Harris and Vic Lombardi, were responsible for half of the six finely pitched games in the majors yesterday, to give the lefthanders a record of eight victories against four defeats in three days.

Pollet, back with the St. Louis Cardinals after three years in the air corps, spun a neat five-hitter to beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-2, the only Pirate runs resulting from a two-run homer hit by Rookie Ralph Kiner in the eighth inning. St. Louis offset this prodigious wallop by roaring back with four runs in its half of the same game to break a 2-2 tie and earn a two-to-one edge in the series.

Harris, making his postwar debut with Boston's Red Sox following four years in the Canal zone, held Washington to six scattered hits as the Sox defeated the Senators, 3-1, to sweep the three-game series. Ted Williams' run-producing triple and Johnny Pesky's three hits which drove in two runs accounted for the Boston tallies.

Lombardi helped Brooklyn's Dodgers make an auspicious home debut before 29,825 fans by taming the vaunted New York Giants' power hitters with half a dozen safeties as Leo Durocher's rookie squad handed its interborough rival its first defeat of the young season, 8-1. A big five-run third inning at the expense of Harry Feldman broke a scoreless deadlock and started the Brooks on the road to victory.

Previous lefty winners this season were Hal Newhouse of Detroit; Earl Johnson, Red Sox; Sam Zoldak, St. Louis Browns; Heintzelman, Pirates, and Lanier, Cards. The losers include Frank Howard and Oscar Judd, Philadelphia Phillies; Brecheen, Cards, and Shoun, Cincinnati Reds.

56 Schools In Hayward Relay Meet

EUGENE, April 19 (AP)—More than 700 prep tracksters from 56 Oregon prep schools, a record entry list, open competition in the ninth annual Hayward relays here today.

Fifteen A schools—those with more than 500 students—hit the cinders today, with B and C schools beginning tomorrow. The B schools have enrollments from 150 to 500; C, enrollments of less than 150.

All three 1945 champions—Grant of Portland, class A, Scappoose, class B, and Sheridan, class C—will be defending their titles. Grant, which carried off the city relays in Portland, ranks as a favorite in the A division.

Class A entrants: Grant, Lincoln, Franklin, Washington, Jefferson, Benson, Commerce, all of Portland; Grants Pass, Salem, Roseburg, Medford, Bend, Milwaukie, Klamath Falls, Eugene, and Springfield.

Class B entrants: Rainier, Hood River, Coquille, Junction City, Cottage Grove, Prineville, Beaverton, Columbia Prep, Vernonia, Molalla, University of Eugene, Redmond, Seaside, Tigard, Lakeview, Scappoose, Ashland, St. Helens, Marshfield, West Linn, North Bend, Canby, Hill of Portland.

Class C entrants: Knappa-Svenson, Arlington, Falls City, Coburg, Harrisburg, Merrill, St. Mary's, Chemawa, Sheridan, Siuslaw, Monroe, Junction City, Jefferson City, Henley, Malin and McKenzie.

His best was a three-run homer, three singles, two stolen bases, four runs batted in and a first day .800 batting average. Robinson was the key figure in the Royals' 14-1 slaughter of the Jersey City Giants.
