

Air Scouting Unit Planned

Ambitious plans are underway by the local Boy Scout council for the formation of an Air Scouting unit.

Air Scouting is a new field in the Boy Scout program and will include background work for aviation. Meteorology, aircraft structure, theory of flight, design, aerodynamics, and all allied subjects will be offered. Actual flight instruction may be taken individually by the members, independent of the Scout program.

Twenty-seven young men have signed up with the Boy Scout office, signifying their desire to join if a troop is organized.

Included in the new national Air Scout program will be a 14-day trip to an army air base where the Scouts will be able to avail themselves of the facilities of the field, including actual flight if their parents consent, under the supervision of Scout officials.

Requirements for joining the program if a troop is installed are an interest in aviation, that the young man be at least 15 years old, and that he pass a strict physical examination.

Vacancies Exist At Air Stations

The civil aeronautics administration announces that a number of vacancies exist at various airway communications stations of the federal airways system in Alaska. Veterans with military communications experience who can demonstrate ability to send and receive international Morse code at the rate of 30 words a minute and touch type at the rate of 35 words per minute are eligible for consideration for the position.

New personnel are ordinarily employed as assistant aircraft communicators grade CAF-5 at an approximate salary of \$3300 per annum.

The civil aeronautics administration operates approximately 40 airway communication stations in Alaska at strategic points.

Interested persons with the necessary requirements can obtain further information regarding these positions by addressing the local CAA office in care of box 988, Klamath Falls.

Emergency Building Projects Approved

PORTLAND, Ore., April 19 (AP)—The district civilian production administrator director today announced that some \$370,500 more of "emergency" construction projects have been approved.

Nelson English reported that applications for \$1,335,000 of additional construction were filed yesterday.

Newly approved projects, aside from one \$140,000 building and an \$88,000 building here, include: Vancouver, Wash., \$50,000 warehouse for Pioneer Freight Lines; Salem, \$55,000 for Western Paper Converting company.

The Northwest Communications council of the AFL-International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and the independent communications employees' union are the two unions. Voting is taking place at Mount Vernon, Forest Grove, Coos Bay, La Grande and in the Klamath area at Lakeview.

The West Coast Telephone regional offices are in Lakeview and lines extend to Chiloquin, Fort Klamath and surrounding areas.

TACOMA, Wash., April 19 (AP)—Pleading guilty to drawing allotment checks as the common law wife of Bernard Zawicki, Portland, Ore., soldier, after marrying James S. Dickerson, in Tacoma, Grace Dickerson, 31, of Portland, was sentenced yesterday to 27 months in an institution by Federal Judge Charles H. Leavy.

WASHINGTON, April 19 (AP)—Through the years, Parlan M. Irwin, 59-year-old telegrapher on the night shift, formed a habit of operating the elevator himself when he knocked off work at the Southern railroad building here.

Usually the car was left for him at the fifth floor. Last night Irwin, his telephone-operator wife and a messenger, all Southern employees, were leaving together. Irwin opened the door, stepped inside the darkened shaft.

The car was at the sixth floor. Irwin was pronounced dead at emergency hospital early this morning.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 19 (AP)—A spokesman for the AFL Butchers union said today that recognition of AFL Sheep Shearers by sheepmen had averted a planned union stoppage of lamb butchering on Monday.

Milton S. Maxwell, of the Butchers' union, said "nearly all of the sheep shearing contractors have signed up with AFL Sheep Shearers."

The shearers, receiving 20 cents per animal, seek 22½ cents in wage negotiations.

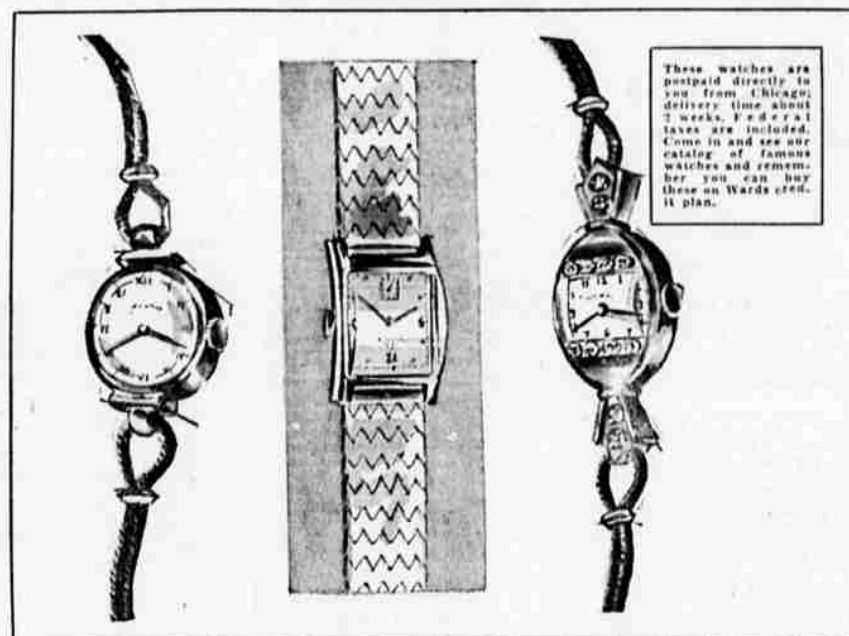
