

Tokyo Flareup May Lead To Hot Political Fight

 WASHINGTON, April 19 (AP)—A first-class political row appears today to be shaping up between Gen. Douglas MacArthur's command and the two inter-allied agencies dealing with Japanese policy and administration.

In Washington, a committee of the Far Eastern commission, 11-nation policy-making agency, scheduled a meeting to discuss the recent United States decision to send more than half a million tons of food to Japan during the first six months of this year.

And in Tokyo, the four-nation advisory council, whose Russian and British members have voiced objections to certain tactics of MacArthur and some of his officers, adjourned until April 30 without agreeing whether Mac-

Truck Drivers Get Wage Boost

PORTLAND, April 19 (AP)—Pay scales, moving upward at intervals in the next year, are provided in a contract announced today by the AFL Teamsters union and the Truck Operators league of Oregon.

About 600 drivers are affected.

The contract provides that over-the-road drivers get \$11 a day as of March 1 this year, \$11.50 on October 1, \$11.75 on January 1, 1947, and \$12 on March 1, 1947.

Portland pick-up truck drivers' pay is to rise from \$9 a day to \$10 by next March.

KF Man Wins Silver Star

An act of heroism performed while he was serving with the infantry in the invasion of Germany earned for S/Sgt. Charles S. Kujawski of Klamath Falls the army's Silver Star.

Kujawski is employed at the Klamath Falls fire department, the same job he held before enlisting in the army in November, 1943.

In November, 1944, Kujawski was serving with the 41st armored infantry regiment in an attack against the Germans near Puffendorf, Germany. His company was forced to withdraw after hard fighting because of extremely heavy opposition. There was no time to evacuate the wounded. Rather than withdraw, Kujawski remained with the wounded and was last seen by his comrades when the Germans overran the position and took the wounded and the men trying to aid them as prisoners.

Kujawski was a prisoner of the Germans from November 16, 1944, to May 20, 1945. It was in November of last year that he was honorably discharged from the army, when the citation was

Suit Seeks To Oust Chessman

SALEM, April 19 (AP)—A circuit court action on file here today, substituting for one filed earlier by Sheldon F. Sackett of Coos Bay, seeks to determine whether Merle Chessman, Astoria, can legally serve on both the state highway commission and the state senate.

District Attorney Miller B. Hayden filed the suit because Sackett, a private citizen, was ruled "without legal capacity" to do so.

Hayden, calling the occupancy of state administrative positions by legislators "a threat to democratic government," said similar actions also will be filed. They will concern State Rep. Earl B. Hill, Cushman, state fish commissioner, and Sen. William H. Strayer, Baker, government board chairman for the state
