

# 142 GI's Executed By Court-Martial Verdicts

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)—Court-martial sentences sent 142 soldiers to their deaths during the war years and ensuing months, a house military subcommittee disclosed today in recommending an extensive overhaul for the army's system of justice.

The group reported that in the period between December 7, 1941 and February 22, 1946, 72 were executed for murder, 51 for rape, 18 for murder and rape, and one for desertion. The findings were set forth in a 25,000-word document sharply critical of what the subcommittee called the injustices, the extreme severity of sentences and the partiality resulting from the existing court-martial system.

## Damage Suit Seeks \$50,000

YREKA, Calif., April 20 (AP)—A \$50,000 damage suit evolving from an automobile accident in which Leonard Essman, Tulelake ranch hand, was fatally injured, was filed last week in superior court here by Essman's widow, Daisy, and the couple's three small children, Leon, Joyce and Nellie, through their guardian ad litem, Mrs. Essman.

Defendants in the suit are Raymond Baker, owner of a pickup truck which allegedly struck the Essman vehicle, and Lewis Baker, 16, Tulelake high school student, driver of the pickup at the time of the accident which occurred near Tulelake last October 18. The complaint charged defendant, Lewis Baker, with so "carelessly, negligently and heedlessly" operating his father's truck so as to strike a car driven by Leonard Essman, causing fatal injuries to the latter.

The accident happened on the Klamath Falls-Reno highway as Essman was driving south and Lewis going in a northerly direction. Essman died on October 21, two days after the wreck.

Sam Hunter of Milton, state organizer and membership chairman has been in the basin area a week lining up the Henley meeting and is now in Lake county on the same business.

## Lowly Egg, Not Lushwell, Due To Get Boiled Again

The lowly egg will get boiled again this year and change its pristine whiteness for the ravishing hues of the rainbow.

Hens, or is it rabbits at this time of year?—seem to know the demand for eggs at Easter and increase production and this first postwar Easter is no exception. Eggs are now about 20 cents per dozen cheaper than they were four months ago, ranging in price from 30 to 48 and 50 cents per dozen, with white eggs preferred.

Sales of Easter egg dyes Saturday were running a close second to sales of eggs. The prewar hollow chocolate eggs and rabbits as well as the chocolate-covered marshmallow ones are still absent from store counters. Ginger cookies in the approved shapes have come to the fore and may be had with names put on in cake icing.

Jelly beans, so popular for Easter baskets, and the little "turtle eggs" have not yet made a comeback and baskets themselves are native Americans as they have been during the war years. Before the war most of the baskets came from Japan and Mexico and the little cotton chickens which came from Germany have gone with the war.
