AAUW Features Luncheon Meeting

On Saturday afternoon, April 13, the local chapter of the American Association of University Women held a luncheon meeting in the Willard hotel.

Mrs. Harry Todd reviewed "The Autobiography of William Allen White."

The AAUW conference held this month in Forest Grove was the first one in four years. Members of the local chapter who attended were Mrs. O. K. Puckett, Mrs. Aaron Hoffman and Mrs. Robert P. Ellingson Jr. Mrs. Hoffman, delegate from the Klamath Falls group, reported that three national officers were present. They were Betty Hyslop, national associate in social studies, Washington, D. C., Mrs. Eric Johnson, northwest regional vice president, who was the luncheon speaker, and Beryl Holt of Salem, fellowship chairman for the north Pacific section.

Highlight of the conference was the awarding of two fellowships to aid Oregon women in advanced study. Marian Morange, associate professor of French at Willamette university, was granted the \$1500 fellowship of the Oregon state division to be used for work in 1948 and 1949 toward a degree of doctor of modern languages. May DuBois, assistant professor of home economics education at Oregon State college, was named a graduate fellowship of \$1200, established by the state division in 1942 in honor of Mrs. S. T. Merwin of Portland. Miss DuBois will work for her doctor's degree in home economics, studying teaching and administration at the college level.

Miss Morange plans to study next year at Middlebury, Vermont, Columbia university, and at the Sorbonne in Paris.

A feature of the meeting was the election of officers, to be announced later. Officers who have served for the past year are Mrs. Robert P. Ellingson Jr., president; Mrs. O. K. Puckett, vice president; Phillis Foster, secretary; and Mrs. Howard Listoe, treasurer.

Mrs. Ellingson expressed her appreciation to the officers, committee chairmen, and others who have worked so diligently during the year.

Convention Slated For Women's Clubs

Dr. Martha Eliot, associate chief of the children's bureau, Washington, D. C., will be the principal speaker for the banquet of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs in Portland, Wednesday, May 8. Her topic will be "The Health of Tomorrow's Child." Several will attend from Klamath Falls.

The banquet will be one of the features of the state women's club convention slated for May 6, 7 and 8 in Portland.

The convention will open on Monday morning at the First Christian church of Portland. Morning and afternoon sessions will be devoted to reports on federation work which will be made by state chairmen. Authorities in the fields of health and welfare will present information at each of the daytime sessions.

The evening session on the opening day will feature junior club work with Buena Maris, dean of women at Oregon State college, as the main speaker. The topic for discussion will be "Young Women. Where Are You Going?"

A pan-American theme will follow on the second evening, with Harry K. Newburn, president of the University of Oregon, giving the principal address. Formal announcement will be made of the pan-American scholarship which the federation is to establish this year.

At the closing banquet session, Governor Earl Snell and Mayor Earl Riley of Portland will speak.

On Tuesday morning a presidents' breakfast for presidents of districts and local clubs is scheduled. At noon the junior clubs will have a luncheon.

The Arts museum will be the scene of the largest social event of the convention. A tea will be held at 4:30, Tuesday afternoon, honoring past presidents of the federation.

The fine arts department is planning an art exhibit of the creative efforts of the club women. Each club is expected to participate in the exhibit.

The convention committee is headed by Mrs. Emery Ingham, first vice president of the federation. Mrs. George R. K. Morehead, president of the federation, has arranged for speakers.
