

Business Women Hear Speaker

Problems of bringing order out of chaos following the invasion devastation in The Netherlands and the retreat of the Germans were told by Harlan P. Bosworth Jr., who was guest speaker at the meeting of the Business and Professional Women's club on Monday evening, April 13, at the Willard hotel.

Mr. Bosworth held the rank of lieutenant colonel at the time of his discharge from the army corps of engineers late in 1945, and upon being sent to the continent from England in the autumn of '44, was assigned to the post of chief engineer in The Netherlands, with all phases of rehabilitation under his jurisdiction except the telephone system.

Honor Guest

The speaker pointed out that The Netherlands, just twice the size of Klamath county in area and with a normal population of about nine million, suffered the worst damage of any of the countries, despite efforts of the invading armies to prevent this.

The first job of the military government, Mr. Bosworth said, was to provide food, clothing and tools for the Dutch who were the most willing workers he'd ever seen but were suffering so greatly from malnutrition that they had to be built up before they were able to work. In fact, thousands will carry the marks of malnutrition for the rest of their lives, he stated.

Due to war action, 650,000 acres were flooded in The Netherlands, and when the military government arrived, there were only 21 usable tractors in the entire country and no horses whatsoever. Despite all the handicaps, he stated, that a good portion of this land was put back into cultivation last year, with the result that there was about a 60 per cent crop.

One of the greatest hazards, according to Mr. Bosworth, were the land mines, of which 1,280,000, or about 40 per cent of the land planted in the country, had been removed by the time of his departure, with the loss of one life from about every thousand mines.

In answer to questions, Mr. Bosworth stated that he feels the Dutch people are doing everything possible to help themselves and bring their country back to a productive basis. In fact, that at the time he left, The Netherlands was already ahead of the other countries in this respect.

Other special awards presented during the evening went to Lorraine Quillen, Martha Berg and Mrs. Russell. Joy Rolph acted as program chairman.

During a short business session, Mrs. Quillen reported that approximately \$100 was derived from a BPW rummage sale held last Saturday, and plans were discussed for holding a similar sale in the near future. Money taken in at Saturday's sale will go to swell the Chinese Nurses fund, the club's main project this year.
