

Cannery Men Picket Ships

SEATTLE, April 22 (AP)—While Alaska ports were available for shipping again after the longshore strike ended Saturday, new troubles faced Alaskans today as members of the CIO-affiliated Alaska Salmon Cannery Workers union continued to picket northbound ships here.

Alaska Steamship officials said last night the strike probably would cut off virtually all shipping to territorial ports.

Union officials said they would picket only boats intending to carry cannery supplies or workers, but steamship officials said the company, as a public service corporation, could not discriminate between different types of freight or passengers.

Alaska carriers were to meet Sunday in an effort to get shipping moving with commodities other than those bound for the canneries.

The cannery workers are asking a 20-cent hourly increase over the present 69-cent basic wage, a 40-hour week and an increase from \$25 to \$50 in "standby" pay designed to compensate cannery workers idle here while awaiting transportation.

The Alaska Salmon Industry, Inc., with whom the cannery workers are contracted, offered to raise the standby pay to \$40 but rejected the wage demand.

Building Boom On In 2 Oregon Towns

CANYON CITY, April 22 (AP)—A building boom is underway in Grant county's little twin cities of Canyon City and John Day.

Japs Executed For Tortures

SHANGHAI, April 22 (AP)—Glum-faced Maj. Gen. Masataka Kaburagi, former chief of staff of the imperial Japanese 34th army, and four of his subordinates died on the gallows at Ward Road jail this morning for their part in the torture parade and strangulation of three American flyers at Hankow in December, 1944.

This was the first execution of war criminals by Americans in the China theater.

The prisoners, their hands bound, were led one at a time into the tiny execution chamber at 45 minute intervals. The charges upon which they were convicted were read to them, their heads were encased in black hoods and they were hanged.

Kaburagi fell first at 8:17 a. m. The others executed, in sequence, were Warrant Officer Tsutomu Fujii, Sgt. Major Shoezo Masui, Sgt. Koichi Masuda and Lance Cpl. Yosaburo Shirakawa.

State Tax Study Commission Meets

SALEM, April 22 (AP)—The state tax study commission met here today for an informal discussion preliminary to drafting its recommendations to the legislature, which will meet next January.

The commission reviewed testimony it has received, and discussed proposed new sources of tax revenue, including a sales tax. It also discussed the possibility of reducing the cost of government and whether to remove the constitutional 6 percent tax limitation.

Oregon Wheat Men Not Holding Grain

PORTLAND, April 22 (AP)—The USDA Production and Marketing association reported today that Oregon wheat producers are not holding back their grain.

A.A.A. committees in Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam and Union counties said a farm check showed 146,243 bushels of wheat delivered to elevators since April 1, and another 279,911 bushels due for delivery by June 1.

The PMA estimated that was 40,000 or 50,000 bushels above normal marketing for the period.

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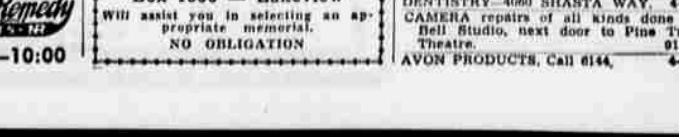
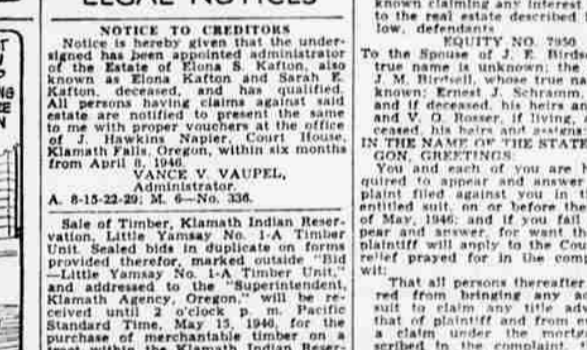
