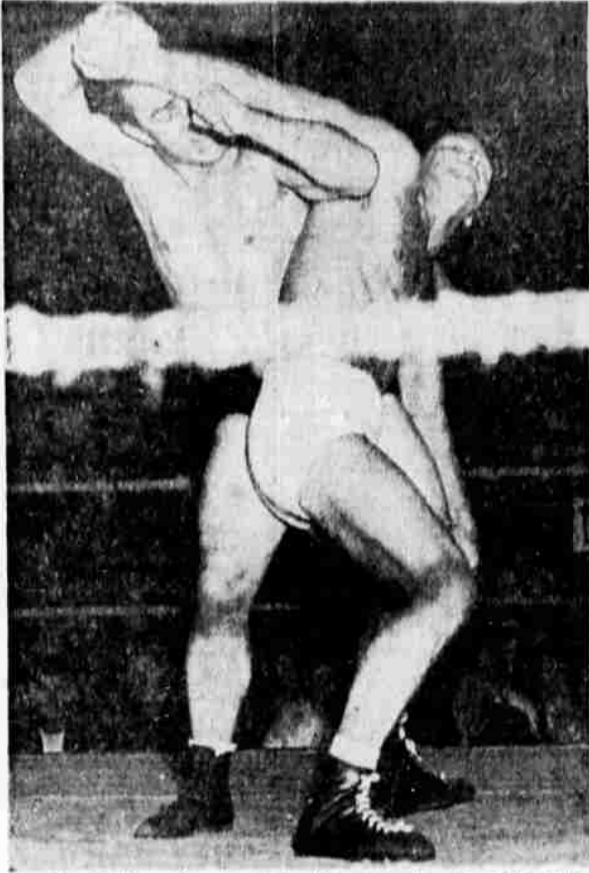


Ross Attempts To Grapevine Kiser

Five Bouts Arranged For First Fistic Card Here

Five bouts, a couple of five rounds and three of four frames, have been matched for the opening pugilistic card to be staged in the armory Tuesday night. Bob Ross and Bruce Miller will tangle in one of the five-round matches. Both are mid-dleweights weighing about 152 pounds.

In the other main event match Chuck Kujawski and LeRoy Burckley, lightweight, are paired to swap leathers.

The prelims put Lloyd Smith and Dally Lotches together at 140, Teddy Roosevelt and Johnny Huff at 135, and Rudy Carlson and Jack Jones, 140.

Derby Prices

The \$100,000 Kentucky Derby coming up, in pre-gallop gossip, is boiling down to a contest between two highly thought-of horses with a couple more getting a share in the advance notice.

There are still about 50 eligible three-year-olds listed as probable starters although the field had been pared from the 140 colts, geldings and fillies originally named for the 72nd running of the derby, and will be cut further.

A week ago Knockdown, brown colt owned by Maine Chance farms, was in the book at 3-2, as was Star Pilot, another brown colt entered by Maine Chance farms. Those were the shortest odds quoted.

Yesterday Knockdown worked a mile and an eighth at Churchill Downs in 1:56 very easily and his stablemate Star Pilot toured the distance in the same time but was laboring heavily at the finish. The Derby is a mile and a quarter.

Today Knockdown is still quoted at 5-2 and Star Pilot is currently 10-4-2.

Spy Song, a colt owned by Charles T. Fisher of Dixiana farms, is now quoted at 6-2 and a week ago was 12-6. Rippey, bay colt owned by William Helis, has come down from 20-10-5 to 6-2-1 today.

Eleven Enter Hall Of Fame

NEW YORK, April 24 (AP)—Baseball's hall of fame at Cooperstown, N. Y., has 11 new members today including the famous Chicago Cubs' double play combination of Tinker-Evers-to-Chance.

The latest additions were voted into the diamond shrine by a special oldtimers committee, named by the late Commissioner K. M. Landis to honor players who otherwise might never be elected.

No player received enough votes for election at the baseball writers' poll last year. Their last choice was Rogers Hornsby in 1942.

Joe Tinker was the Cubs' shortstop from 1902 to 1912 while Johnny Evers was playing second base and Frank Chance, "the peerless leader," was on first base and managing most of the time.

Two outfielders were selected, Jesse Burkett who hit .423 and .410 for Cleveland in the National league in 1895 and 1896 and later starred with the St. Louis Browns, and Tom McCarthy, a star of the Browns in the old "four time winners" days.

Of the six pitchers elected by the committee, two were lefthanders—Rube Waddell, the eccentric ace of the Philadelphia Athletics from 1902, and Eddie Plank who was his teammate.

Big Ed Walsh of the Chicago White Sox, who won 40 games in 1908, was picked, as were Jack Chesbro, who won 14 straight for the New York Highlanders in 1905, and Clark Griffith who pitched and managed at Chicago, New York, Cincinnati and Washington. Joe (Iron Man) McGinnity of the New York Giants, a 35-game winner for John McGraw in 1904, was the sixth player.

Head's No-Hitter Dwarfs Big League Diamond News

Ed Head's no-hitter dwarfs the rest of the baseball news today, emphasizing the latent strength of a Brooklyn staff that may give the St. Louis Cardinals many anxious moments.

Not so long ago in Sanford, Fla., President Branch Rickey of the flock despised of the Dodger hurling corps. B. R. said he didn't have a single first class "stopper" in the bunch.

That was before Kirby Higbe returned from the army, before anyone signed a contract. Joe Nathan signed and Hank Bahenman ever heard of Hank Bahenman—before Head proved his right arm was sound.

The lean righthander from Selma, La., could not have picked a more effective way of proving to the Brooklyn management that he had completely recovered from arm trouble that once threatened to end his big league career.

Head walked three men and one got a lift on an error by Shortstop Pee Wee Reese. Fine fielding plays saved him three times. Rookie Carl Furillo ran to drag down Tommy Holmes' long drive and Pete Resier made a fine stop on Al Roberge's smash in the third.

The most exciting touch was provided by Rookie Catcher Ferrell Anderson who had hit his first big league homer in the sixth for the final run of the Brooks' 5-0 margin over Boston's Mort Cooper. After Head walked Pinch Hitter Chuck Workman in the ninth, he struck out Connie Ryan and Anderson's bullet peg to first picked off Workman for a most important double play.

It was a sixth straight win for the Dodgers but they needed it to remain in a first place with the St. Louis Cardinals who also recited off a sixth successive victory at the expense of Cincinnati, 3-2. Reliever Ken Burkhardt, the second of three Red Bird choppers, received the credit when three singles, an error and an outfield fly cost Nate (Hard Luck) Andrews another setback.

Oregon made it four straight wins, defeating a poor-second Idaho with a mighty 13 to 2 final and the Huskies of the University of Washington smashed the Washington State nine 4 to 1 yesterday as northern division baseball scrambles unwound.

At Eugene, the Webfoots grabbed a full game lead over the second place Oregon State gang as Dick Rodiger, frosh catcher, broke up the game with a grand slam homer in the sixth inning to spark a six-run rally.

At Seattle the Cougars took their sixth straight whipping as the Huskies stole the show.

The hat goes in the ring again this weekend, with Idaho tackling OSC at Corvallis Wednesday and Thursday, and the Huskies and Webfoots clash at Eugene Friday and Saturday.

Weather Cancels Silver Ski Meet

SEATTLE, April 24 (AP)—Thwarted by weather, officials of the Silver Skis tourney at Mount Rainier announced the event has been cancelled until 1947.

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Solons Whittle Away At Frisco's Margin

Giant killing by the Sacramento Solons, who arose from the dungeon, left the San Francisco Seals only half a game ahead in the Pacific Coast Baseball league today, with a double opening for second-ranking Los Angeles to catch up.

The two-hit pitching of Lefty Al Smith produced the 1-0 Solon victory over the Seals yesterday, whittling the league leader's ratio down to 13 wins to seven losses. The Los Angeles Angels, idle yesterday, get their double-headed opportunity against third-place Oakland today. The Angels have 17 wins to seven defeats.

Portland beat the San Diego Padres, 2 to 1, in 13 innings, and Hollywood's Stars pounded the Seattle Rainiers for a 11-4 decision to take over fourth place from the Padres and relegate them to the second division whence they came the day before.

Star of the proceedings was Hollywood's Tommy O'Brien, recent acquisition from the Pittsburgh Pirates. In five times at bat he cracked out a single, double and two home runs.

O'Brien gave far warning on his first trip to the plate in the opening frame by bringing home two runs. His homers were in successive appearances in the fifth and seventh innings. In all he drove in six scores. Eddie Erault rattled the Rainiers 11 hits in his roller coaster ride to victory.

At San Francisco, Smith, a former Cleveland Indian, had a chance for one-hit performance when Neil Sheridan got an infield single with two out in the seventh inning. The Solons fash-

loned their run out of Eddie Zippy's double and Bill Conroy's single in the fifth.

The Portland Beavers won their extended affair in the home park on a San Diego error. Mayo Smith tripled in the 13th inning and Danny Amaral drove out a grounder which was fumbled by Shortstop Joe Gedzius as Smith scurried home. The Padres outfit hit the Beavers, 13 to 4.

Ex-GI Gets First Round Fight

LOS ANGELES, April 24 (AP) Pete Morelli, who claimed the heavyweight championship in the European theater of operations, had a rude setback as he made his professional debut here last night. The ex-GI from Stockton, Calif., was knocked out in the first round by Johnny Haynes, giant Los Angeles negro.

Morelli had won 69 fights as an amateur and nine as a pro, 48 amateurs, eight pros by knockouts.

But Haynes caught him flush on the jaw right after the opening bell. Morelli weighed 187, Haynes 221. The contest was scheduled for 10 rounds.

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
