

CIO Secretary Takes Cut At 'Sabotaging' Of OPA

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—CIO Secretary James B. Carey said today that "certain greedy interests" are out to sabotage price controls. He got into an immediate argument with Senator Millikin (R-Colo.) on whether party politics is involved.

The exchange took place at hearings of the senate banking committee on legislation to extend price controls a year beyond June 30.

Carey said two republican members of the house had referred publicly to the OPA act as an economic narcotic. He cited this in saying there is in this country "an economic monarchy which makes its own laws."

Millikin protested that a lot of democrats in the house had the same feeling as the two republicans Carey mentioned. The senator argued that OPA is not a partisan issue.

Wreck OPA. Carey said he regretted that "too many republicans and too many democrats of the same ilk went out to do a job on OPA."

He added that more democrats voted for OPA without amendments than did republicans.

"There are more democrats in the house than there are republicans," he said.

Carey took several shots at the National Association of Manufacturers, which opposes OPA and has carried on an active campaign against it.

"NAM has the worst 10 per cent of the worst 10 per cent

of the employers of the country," he said.

He agreed with Senator Mitchell (D-Wash.) that it is unfortunate that the American people do not have the resources of the NAM to present its case on price controls.

"I haven't seen any lack of propaganda for OPA," Millikin remarked.

The house has voted to extend OPA nine months but with amendments which OPA sponsors call "crippling."

Rates Bureau Shifts Status

Klamath Basin Rates bureau today assumed the status of an independent organization, associated with the chamber of commerce but not part of it.

Chamber directors yesterday adopted a recommendation of the rates committee approving the change.

Chairman George P. Davis said the rates bureau has now been in operation long enough to prove its worth and to stand on its own feet. He said constructive results have been achieved through the bureau, and that it should be able to secure financial support independently of the chamber of commerce, for a while at least. Offices will remain in the chamber of commerce quarters. Paul Taylor is manager of the rates bureau.

Number Of Firms Upped

SALEM, April 25 (AP)—The number of firms subject to the state unemployment compensation law has soared to 11,213, the highest point since the law became effective, the state unemployment commission said today.

The number is 1300 more than a year ago, the commission asserting the increase in the number of firms has been steady since the war ended.

Of the 489 new firms which have come under the law this year, 102 are restaurants, 101 construction firms, 66 service concerns, 61 retail stores, and 27 manufacturers. Only 23 new gasoline stations have been listed since the end of the war.

The commission said that it hopes the new firms will employ several thousand persons this year.

Delinquents Said Taking 1-Way Path To Big House

PORTLAND, April 25 (AP)—Juveniles who began delinquency at the war's outset are growing up to major crimes, two juvenile officials agreed today.

Judge Donald E. Long of the court of domestic relations and Capt. Elizabeth S. Moorad, commander of the Portland police women's protective division, said that more serious infractions can be expected from the youngsters who have had practice in minor delinquency.

The 10 and 12-year-olds, who started misbehaving in 1942 perhaps as a result of both parents being away at work, are 14 and 16 now—the age for car stealing and burglary.

Salem Gets Another Medford Mentor

SALEM, April 25 (AP)—Leonard Warren, assistant coach at Medford, has been named assistant coach of Salem high school beginning next fall as football line coach.

The school board also reported West Roeder, pre-war tennis coach at Salem, had resigned and that a bid of a Portland firm to construct a new high school athletic plant has been accepted. The job includes a new football stadium and tennis courts.

Dock Tie-Up In Deadlock

PORTLAND, Ore., April 25 (AP)—A new threat to shipping activity in Oregon harbors developed today after the CIO Supercargoes and Checkers union declared they would stand pat on demands for one checker for each long-shore gang working ships here.

R. J. Wolf, president of the union, announced after last night's union meeting that the checkers would insist on ship operators following the "practice of the port" despite an arbitration decision that employers could decide the number of checkers.

The Waterfront Employers association declared the agreement with the union would be cancelled unless contract provisions are followed.

The dispute, which developed early this year, broke out again Tuesday and halted loading on the Sioux Falls Victory, an American-Hawaiian Steamship company vessel.
