13 Squads Enter KUHS Cinder Meet

Thirteen track teams, representing southern Oregon and northern California schools, have returned entry blanks for the invitational cinder meet to be held on Modoc field Saturday afternoon.

The victory, while leveling the Indians' won and lost record to an even .600, failed to advance them from their fourth place position behind the New York Yankees, Detroit and the Boston Red Sox.

The Yankees moved into undisputed possession of first place in the American league by whipping the Red Sox 12-5 on the wings of a 15-hit attack against five Sox hurlers. Tex Hughson and Ted Williams, a pair of Hub favorites, disappointed a near record crowd of 30,028 who saw the Sox drop from first to third place.

Hughson, seeking his third straight triumph, failed to last five innings and was charged with the defeat. Williams was roundly booed when he grounded into three successive double plays after polling a 400-foot triple in the fourth inning.

Dodgers, Cards Even
Brooklyn and the St. Louis Cardinals continued their merry battle for first place in the National league as each team won its seventh straight after bowing in the season's opener. The Dodgers routed the Philadelphia Phils, 11-3, for their 12th consecutive win in Shibe park. The Phils dropped all 11 games to the Dodgers on their home field last year. Rookie Carl Furillo, with four hits including a home run and three runs batted in, paced the Dodger attack.

The Redbirds won their second straight 3-2 game from the Cincinnati Reds, with Stan Musial again driving in the winning run. Southpaw Howie Pollet, although tagged for nine safe blows, was credited with his second victory of the season.

Truett (Rip) Sewell, an old nemesis of the Chicago Cubs, tamed the Bruins again with a nine-hitter in pitching the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 4-3 decision over the National league champions. It was Sewell himself who batted in the winning run when his eighth inning single broke a 3-3 deadlock.

Outslugged Giants
Boston's Braves rebounded from their hitless efforts against Brooklyn head on Tuesday by raking five New York Giants hurlers for 14 hits including successive home runs by Tommy Holmes and Ray Sanders, to outslug the Polo Grounders 10-7.

Held scoreless for seven rounds, Washington's Senators rallied for four runs in their half of the eighth to overcome a 1-0 deficit and defeat the Philadelphia Athletics 4-2. A single by Pinch Hitter George Binks accounted for two runs with a Stan Spence's double sending in two more. Detroit and Chicago's White Sox were idle.

Angels Muff Chance To Overtake Frisco

The hot breath of the Los Angeles Angels on the neck of the top-ranking San Francisco Seals was cooled to a gentle pant today after the Angelings took a double shellacking in their home park to drop two full games behind the Pacific Coast league leaders.

While the Oakland Acons were putting the chill on the Angels 7-2 and 3-2, gangling Cliff McEton racked up his fifth consecutive pitching triumph for the Seals with a 3-1 win over Sacramento. San Diego's Padres bounced back into the first division with a 4-1 victory over the Portland Beavers, while Seattle evened its series with the Hollywood Stars, winning 5-2.

Los Angeles' double loss to the Oaks brought to an end the league's best winning streak of the year. Before yesterday's setback the Angels had copied 11 of their last 12 games to move within half a notch of first place. After being held hitless by Dick Conger for the first seven innings of the opener, the Oaks unleashed their heavy artillery in the last two frames to score their seven runs. Wally Westlake's homer with none aboard in the fourth inning of the nightcap broke the scoring ice for Oakland and gave Pitcher Ambrose Palica a lead he never relinquished.

Melton's four-hit victory broke a two-game San Francisco losing streak that had threatened to topple the O'Doulmen from the top of the ladder. Hitting hero of the encounter was Seal First

Baseman Ferris Fain who got two-for-three and drove in two runs. The loss dropped Sacramento into a tie with Seattle for the cellar.

San Diego's 4-1 decision over Portland put the Padres back into fourth place, four percentage points ahead of the top second division clubs. Jake Mooney, a consistent winner with the Beavers last year when they took the league championship, was charged with the defeat.

Seattle's slow-starting Rainiers showed a reversal of early-season form by taking a three-run lead over Hollywood in the first inning on five singles and going on to win 5-2. The visiting stars were kept well in check by Veteran Glenn Elliott who allowed lone tallies in only the third and ninth innings. Catcher Hal Sume led the Rainier attack with three hits in four trips to the plate.
