The community has been sorely shocked by the passing of two of its beloved citizens. Mrs. Ella Oliver, age 65, passed away quite suddenly last Sunday afternoon, April 14, at Haughson, Calif., at the Morris Dick ranch, and Mrs. Edna Mulkey, age 61, passed away in the manner while raking the leaves from her flower bed at her ranch home, last Sunday in late afternoon.
