

CIO Southern Organizing Drive Long-Range Scheme

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 26 (AP)—The CIO organizing campaign in the south will not be a whirlwind drive of short duration but a long-range movement lasting a year and maybe longer.

George Baldanzi, an assistant director of the CIO drive, disclosed in an interview today that he had arranged to drop all his duties as executive vice president of the CIO textile workers union for at least a year to live in the south.

Driver Robbed At Gun-Point

MEDFORD, April 26 (AP)—Sheriff Howard Gault said today two Ohio youths are accused of compelling a woman and a five-year-old boy to drive them 12 miles from town, taking her money, then leaving them stranded.

He reported that Mrs. Ray Young said the boys, wearing navy uniforms, pulled a gun and commanded her to drive north on the Pacific highway yesterday. She and Keith Harrison, 5, had just stepped into her car, parked downtown here.

The sheriff quoted the woman as saying the youths took \$7.50 from her purse and, north of Gold Hill, told her and the boy to get out of the car. Neither was harmed, but the youngster became hysterical.

Gault said the youths, arrested near Drain in Mrs. Young's car, were both from Celina, Ohio. The papers on S 2/c Richard Ellis Clark, 18, failed to show him on leave, he stated, and Donald Henry Barther, 16, wore a uniform but had no credentials.

The two were booked at Douglas county jail, Roseburg, on charges of kidnapping and assault and robbery while armed, the sheriff said.

Tennis Court Memorial Eyed

Hopes for the building of a living memorial in the form of a double tennis court were raised at the last meeting of the Henry Memorial committee.
