Social Security Figures Released

Howard J. Nelson, manager of the Klamath Falls field office of the social security board, today released the current figures on the social security program for this area.

"These figures," said Nelson, "reveal substantial employment, and a high degree of participation by the residents of this region in the benefits provided by the social security program."

In the past three months, the local office has issued 1197 original and duplicate social security account number cards. This number represents a decrease of 658 from the number issued in the preceding three months.

Two hundred thirteen residents of this area made claims for social security benefits in the last 90 days. At present there are 1706 benefits in force in the field region, 144 of which have been added in the past three months.
