

Bosox, Yanks Assist Tigers Into AL Lead

Hurricane Hal Newhouser and Hammering Hank Greenberg, a pair of old hands at coming through in the clutch for the world champion Detroit Tigers, are still up to their old tricks and as a result the Bengals are reposing unmolested today at the top of the American league.

The two Tiger stalwarts, who combined their special talents—Greenberg with a grand slam homer and Newhouser with a splendid relief job—to defeat the St. Louis Browns in the final game of the 1945 season for the American league flag, collaborated once more yesterday to vanquish the Browns again 6-3.

The victory enabled the Tigers to take over undisputed possession of first place from the New York Yankees who dropped into a second place tie with Boston by losing to the Red Sox 12-5.

One Bad Inning
Newhouser, despite one bad inning in which he yielded all the enemy runs, southpawed his way to his third straight triumph of the young season. He fanned seven to increase his strikeout output to 22 in 27 frames.

Greenberg enjoyed a perfect day at the dish with two doubles, a single and a free ticket to first. The reconverted first baseman batted in a run and scored two more including the important tying marker in the eighth. A single by Birdie Tebbets followed a moment later to send in Roy Cullenbine with the winning run.

Led by Johnny Pesky and Eddie Pellagrini, the Red Sox reversed yesterday's 12-5 beating by pounding four New York hurlers for 13 hits including a homer, triple and double by Pellagrini and two doubles and a brace of singles by Pesky. Right-hander Joe Dobson held the Yanks to nine hits for his second mound triumph.

Into National Lead
Brooklyn's dazzling Dodgers moved into undisputed possession of first place in the National league without even having to lift a little finger as the St. Louis Cardinals, who shared the top berth with the Browns, slid down to second spot by bowing to the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-3.

A long home run belt by Pittsburgh's Ralph Kiner that traveled fully 450 feet literally knocked the Cards out of the lead.

The Cincinnati Reds squelched their 1945 nemesis, the Chicago Cubs, for the first time in four meetings this season with a 7-5 victory. Three Cub misuses gave the Reds as many runs in the seventh inning and chased Starter Hank Borowy for the second straight time this year.

Cooper Injured
The New York Giants suffered a double blow as they not only bowed to the Boston Braves for the second straight time, 5-4, but lost the services of their ace Catcher Walker Cooper as well. Cooper suffered a fracture of his finger on his right hand when Carvel (Bama) Powell fouled off one of Monte Kennedy's pitches. Cooper will be out of the lineup for at least four weeks.

The Chicago White Sox finally combined tight pitching and stout hitting as they thrashed the Cleveland Indians 11-2 on a 17-hit assault.

PORTLAND, April 26 (AP)—Tommy Calhoun, Oregon AAU welterweight champion, walked out of the amateur ranks today to sign for a 10-round pro bout against Miguel Rubi, Mexico City, here May 3.

Calhoun, 23, was chosen the best fighter in the AAU tourney here. His debut against Rubi will be one of three 10-rounders on the National Boxing club's May 3 card.

The other matches will pit Tommy Moyer and Eddie Wharton, Portland welterweights; and Duane Hoag, Portland and Bert White, Los Angeles, in a return featherweight event.

Baseball Stories

We have received a couple of letters asking why stories of big league and Pacific Coast league baseball games each day are not run on this page, which communications have surprised us no end because the stories, game results and standings are run every day.

American and National league games are covered in a general Associated Press roundup story every day and Pacific Coast loop games are in another AP roundup story. The standings and game results are printed under a permanent head.

Morning papers, such as the Oregonian, have a slight advantage over PMs in that they have results of ball games played any afternoon or night in the paper next morning. Also for these papers the Associated Press prepares individual stories of each game. For afternoon papers all the games are incorporated into a general story. That's what we get over the wire and that's what is printed daily in The Herald and News.

Here's the situation. Take any particular day, Tuesday for example. The major league and Coast league games are played either in the afternoon or at night. This paper receives the results, corrected standings and stories the next morning and they are published that afternoon. Tuesday's games are published on Wednesday's sports page.

Games back there start at 11:30 a. m. to 1 p. m. our time and some are finished before this paper goes to press. We will have as many of the results of today's games as we receive over the wire on the front page of today's paper.

The Associated Press gets news of what goes on in the east out here pretty quick. On a direct wire the stories and scores come into Portland the instant a reporter back east is tapping the letters out on a teletype keyboard. Then they're put on the Oregon network and get down here very soon afterward.

I think that any critics of this arrangement will find, by looking through our files, that in the "good old days before the war" exactly the same system was used with possibly more elaboration than the paper shortage today allows.
