In his response to a series of testimonials, Capt. Coggeshall said that he had received word only yesterday afternoon that the Marine Barracks had been turned over to the navy, clearing incorporation by the navy, assets for negotiation with the state of Oregon for use as an educational center. He voiced strong hope that a satisfactory arrangement can be made with the state.

R. C. Groesbeck, member of the state board of higher education, said that the board is ready to go ahead with the Barracks educational plan if the money is provided. Both he and Groesbeck were optimistic over the prospects for this project.

Groesbeck paid tribute to Capt. Coggeshall for his efforts along an educational line, and Dr. Ralph W. Stearns told of the friendly relationships between the Marine Barracks medical staff and local physicians and surgeons.

Malcolm Epley testified as to Capt. Coggeshall's qualifications as an "ordinary guy" and Charles Stark, John Houston and Mayor Ostendorf added tributes "from the floor."

Rumors Of China Civil War Spread

TIENTSIN, April 27 (AP)—This lusty, bustling former treaty port of North China has a flashback of the jitters. Rumors of civil war are spreading from Manchuria across the great wall.

Within the past week, there have been small interruptions of service on the Peiping-Tientsin railway. There is apprehension that something may happen. Now and then there is a shooting at night on the outskirts of this foreignbuilt city of 1,600,000.

Prowlers Killed
In the week of April 8 to 18 U. S. marine sentries at the old French arsenal shot and killed five Chinese prowlers. Some of the victims were armed. All were wearing parts of Japanese uniforms. A sixth man was captured.

One marine sentry was attacked with a cotton baling hook but ward off his attackers with the butt of a carbine.

The identity of the assailants was not established definitely. One victim had a notebook with a number of Manchurian addresses.

Fight Rages
(A dispatch to the Peiping newspaper, Hin Sheng Pao, from the Szepingkai front reported that fighting continues unabated in Szepingkai. It said the communists are offering stubborn resistance from house to house. It added that 2000 shells daily are fired at communist positions.

(The newspaper's correspondent reported that government Generals Cheng Tung-kuo and Liang Hua-sheng, deputy commander in chief of the national armies in Manchuria, asserted two Japanese machine gunners were captured April 19. The generals said one told them 150 to 160 Japanese machinegunners are fighting with the communists at Szepingkai.)

Morse Smites Party Leaders

PORTLAND, April 27 (AP)—Senator Wayne L. Morse flew here from Washington today and told his constituents that the people, not the GOP leaders, should decide republican party policies.

"It was never intended that the party policy should be dictated by the Tafts and the Brickers and the members of the national committee," Morse said as he went into the Young Republican Federation meeting here. "It is the people of the party who should be the dictators of the policy of the party."

The republican senator from Oregon added that polls show "very little difference between the objectives of the great mass of the republican and of the democratic registered voters of the nation. They divide on questions of administrative conduct but they are very, very close together on questions of basic policies."

Morse was scheduled to speak at the federation convention this afternoon and again at tonight's banquet.
