

Death Takes Garner Lundy

Garner J. Lundy, 48, lifelong resident of Klamath county, was found dead in his bed at the family ranch in Upper Langell valley at 6:30 o'clock this morning. Death was attributed to natural causes although Lundy had been in good health.

Lundy was the son of Mrs. Frank Schmitz of Beatty and was born in Klamath Falls. He had ranched in Bly, Tulelake and Langell valley, operated his place 12 miles east of Bonanza for the past 10 years. The Lundy ranch is located between the Bill Campbell and Lloyd Giff places. Lundy's widow, Bessie, was in San Francisco at the time of his passing, having gone south for medical treatment. There were no children.

According to the deputy coroner's office, Lundy was found dead by a ranch hand, Rudolph Meyer, who called him for breakfast at about 6:30. Lundy was a member of Lakeview lodge No. 1536, B.P.O.E. In addition to his widow and mother, Lundy is survived by a sister, Mrs. Pearl Boye of this city. The remains are at Ward's.

Army Mess System Called Inefficient

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—The army got a bad report card today for a lot of its KP departments.

Secretary of War Patterson was told the army has overstocked food, wasted it and cooked it in a manner "definitely below the accepted practices of commercial hotels and restaurants."

The findings were made by a special nine-man committee of civilian food experts assigned by Patterson to survey army food management and propose conservation methods.

The report card wasn't all bad marks, however. The experts found GI bakeries superior in operation. They also commended the "good quality" of provisions purchased for army use at "the greatest economy." And they found storage facilities generally adequate and well located.

Job Situation Called Static

The employment situation is reported "about static" at the U. S. employment service office at present, by Jack Almeter, manager. The only notable change is the decrease in applications for unemployment compensation, he said.

Contract jobs have not started yet and logging operations are still slow on account of weather conditions.

Alder emphasized today that boys under 18 years of age who plan to work this summer must obtain work permits in advance. To obtain permits from the state it is necessary to furnish birth certificates or other evidence of age. Temporary permits may be issued by the employment service until the state permit is secured but neither may be issued until date of birth is satisfactorily established.

Almeter pointed out, if a certified copy of the birth certificate is not available, evidence of age from an insurance policy at least a year old which clearly shows the age of the person seeking employment will be accepted, as will a baptismal certificate with the impression seal showing the church that issued it.

Spring farm work is opening up and calls from farmers are filled immediately where adequate pay is offered for work. Clyde James, manager of the farm labor office, said today. At present applications for work exceed calls from farmers he said, with women potato cutters especially plentiful.

PAINTSVILLE, Ky., April 30 (AP)—Two men were lodged in the Johnson county jail today on charges of rape and attempting to rape a 19-year-old girl who later fell over a cliff, breaking both legs, and lay out in the open for two days and nights before she was discovered.

Members of the school board refused comment on the dismissals.
