

Lakeview Fire Loss Heavy

LAKEVIEW, April 30—Lakeview, like the entire nation, suffered one of the worst fire losses in its history during January of this year.

Dean North, chairman of the Lakeview Lions club, made this statement today to substantiate fire prevention committee of the need for a preventive program of the type to be announced soon by the Lions. The latter will be assisted in this campaign by the civic committee of the Lake County chamber of commerce.

One of the first features of the campaign to reduce excessive losses, North said, will be a clean-up program, the dates of which will be announced soon. Lions committee members to assist in the work are Fire Chief William Arzner and Rudy McLane. The entire club membership will participate in the clean-up program. E. G. Favell is chairman of the chamber group, which also will take part.

January losses here include the Masonic hall fire, one of the city's worst, and three others classed as major losses.

Over the nation, Chief Arzner pointed out, fire losses reached almost \$50,000,000 during the initial month of the year. If this rate continues, he went on, the national fire toll during the next 10 years will exceed four billion dollars and will cost the nation 100,000 lives.

Inasmuch as Lakeview has been keeping pace with this constantly increasing fire loss rate, Arzner and North concluded, it can readily be seen that the need for such a program as is being developed by the Lions and chamber is most evident.

Plan Offered To Keep Vet

LAKEVIEW, April 30 — In order to retain the services of Dr. Otto Lutteman as veterinarian in Lake County after the conclusion of his cattle testing work, the newly organized 20-40 Farmers have undertaken the sponsorship of a plan that will go into effect June 1.

Under this plan, advance fees will be collected throughout the year to assure the veterinarian of a wage salary sufficient to keep him here until his private practice can be built up to warrant his retention here. The farmers' organization will guarantee him a monthly salary for a period of 12 months under this plan. The fees collected in advance will be applied to work done by the veterinarian in proportion to the amount advanced.

Dr. Lutteman has expressed his willingness to remain and give the county the benefit of his experience and services under this plan. All advance fees will be handled through the 20-40 Farmers, who will be responsible for the veterinarian's salary.

The organization will have a man or two in each district, who will be authorized to collect advance fees, and will explain the plan to anyone interested. The districts covered and the person in charge will be as follows:
