Feller Heaves No-Hitter At Yank Sluggers

Bobby Feller's brilliant no-hit, no-run job against the New York Yankees should still once and for all the springtime rumors that Rapid Robert had lost his fast one.

"My fast ball was my best pitch all the way," Feller said in the clubhouse after the ball game, "but I also used a lot of curves and sliders. I believe I had better stuff than when I pitched my other no-hitter against the White Sox in the 1940 opener."

Feller was amused and slightly peeved about reports he was "slipping." Before the game, Manager Lou Boudreau shrugged off questions about Feller with a quiet, "wait until after the game and then talk to me." After the game, nobody asked any questions.

Floyd Bevens matched Feller goose egg for goose egg up to the ninth when Frankie Hayes, Bobby's batterymate, planted a home run in the left field stands. The Tribe ace had a close call in the ninth when an error, sacrifice and an infield out moved George Stinewiss around to third with two out but Charley Keller rolled out to Second Baseman Ray Mack to lift the suspense and loosen a throaty roar from the banner weekday crowd of 37,144 fans.

Only two others reached second base and they died there as Feller was superb under pressure. The only fielding play of note was a sparkler by Boudreau who raced across second base from his shortstop post to grab a roller off Stinewiss' bat and throw him out by a step in the first inning.

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Pels Hand Grizzlies 4-3 Clip

The Pelicans edged out a 4 to 3 win from the Ashland Grizzlies on Del Moro field yesterday afternoon behind four-hit pitching of Joe Carroll who won his third game of the season against one loss.

Ashland was off to an early lead in the first frame, counting twice on one hit and two Klamath miscues. The Pels came back with one run on Irvin Whit's triple into left and a single by Bill Bari in the second.

Charles Heilbronner's single past third, Bill Jones' single, a fielder's choice and two long flies contributed two more tallies in the third, putting the Pelicans in the lead.

Ashland counted again in the first of the sixth on singles by Speece and Mitchell and an infield blow, tying the score at three-all.

In their half of the sixth the Pelicans scored again to put the game on ice. Jones lifted a triple to left-center, Coleman filed out, Whit was intentionally passed and Sari hit a bounding single over the mound to score Jones.

Carroll tightened up after the first two innings and finished strong, fanning 12 Ashland batters. Jim Mitchell, Ashland hurler, allowed only six hits, including the two triples, and struck out seven.

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Seals Maintain Loop Lead; Bevos Snap Lose Streak

Larry Jensen, ex-GI of the San Francisco Seals, had his sixth victory of the season today as the Seals and Oakland Acorns stretched their lead over their southern, first-division rivals in the Pacific Coast Baseball League.

Despite poor support from the leiders, Jensen pitched the eagle-leading Seals to a 4-3 decision yesterday over the Los Angeles Angels, erstwhile challengers now in third place.

The opening of a seven-game series at San Francisco produced the Seals' 23rd win against nine losses and enabled them to maintain a three-game edge over second-place Oakland.

Five Seal Miscues

Jensen, who played part of the 1945 season after returning from military duty, let the Angels have 10 hits and the Seals committed five errors, but he squeezed out the victory with the help of pinch-hitter Sal Taormina's single to produce the winning run in the eighth inning. The right-handed hurler from Forest Grove, Ore., has lost only once this year.

The Oakland Acorns had a rugged and lengthy pitching duel with the Stars at Hollywood. But Acorn hurler Bryan Stephens proved equal to the occasion by going 12 innings and driving in the winning run with a single for the 1-0 victory.

Hollywood loaded the bases in the opening frame but the Oaks tightened up and went on to defeat Edward Erautt, who pitched all the way for the Stars. Stephens allowed nine and Erautt eight hits.

Sacramento came from behind for a 4-1 win over the fourth-place San Diego Padres on the pitching of heretofore luckless Tony Freitas, who was regularly in the losing column although he allowed only eight runs in seven games. The Solons chased Padre Carl Dumber from the mound on a two-run rally in the seventh inning. Klaus Poffenberger replaced him.

Beavers Snap Streak

The Portland pennant defenders snapped a losing streak and reduced the Seattle Rainiers to the basement with a 2-1 triumph at Portland. Joe Dobbins, in his first game for the Beavers after switching over from Seattle, paced the Portland attack with a single and a double, batting in two runs.

Tom Turner, former catcher for the St. Louis Browns, in his debut for the Beavers drove home the other run.

SALEM, May 1 (AP)—Members of Motor Coach Employees-AFL local 1055, on strike for higher wages from Oregon Motor Stages since April 5, were voting here today on a proposal to accept a \$1.24 an hour wage, return to work and arbitrate for the remainder of the \$1.20 demand.

The move by striking drivers to halt sale of the strike bound city transportation system to a group of ex-servicemen who planned taking over the buses individually was made late yesterday by an assistant union business agent.

Earlier the company announced agreements had been reached for sale of the bus systems of Salem and Eugene to a group of veterans organized as Veterans Transit association.

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British Golfer To Meet Nelson

NEW YORK, May 1 (AP)—Richard Burton, British open champion who recently expressed doubt concerning Byron Nelson's low scores, has accepted an invitation to meet the American pro golf title-holder in a 36-hole match, Elmer Ward said today.

Ward, sponsor of the Goodall Round Robin tourney, last week offered to pay all of Burton's expenses plus a bonus if the British champion would come to the U. S. for a match with Nelson.

Eighteen holes of the match will be played on the Winged Foot course in Westchester county, New York, on Wednesday, May 29, with the last half of the duel carded for the following day. That also will be the first round of the Goodall round robin and Burton will continue in that event against 15 of the top pro golfers in the United States.

New Postwar Peak For Retail Prices

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—Average retail prices over the nation reached a new postwar peak in mid-March.

In reporting this today the bureau of labor statistics noted a fractional hike in rents for the first quarter of 1946, one-tenth of one per cent, and said it represented the first net increase since December 1944.

With higher prices for most principal items in the family budget," the bureau said, its consumers' price index advanced 0.5 per cent between February 15 and March 15 to 130.2 per cent of the 1935-39 average.

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
