

USRS Hires Staff To Take Over 'Jap' Camp Monday

A staff of 35 or 40 persons will be continued at the Tulelake "Jap camp" after it is turned over by the WRA to the reclamation service Monday, it was stated today by E. Latou Stephens, reclamation bureau superintendent here.

Stephens said all the members of the new staff are being hired from the personnel of the WRA. This includes a considerable number of firemen and policemen. Guy Booker, formerly of WRA, will be in charge.

The reclamation bureau is taking over the custody of the huge layout of frame buildings for the general land office, which is to be officially in charge after WRA turns it over May 5.

WRA officials at the camp were closing out their business this week, and Ray Best, project director for the past two and one-half years, issued a final statement to members of his staff.

Best said they would be physically separated with closure of the camp, but they will "continue together in spirit."

In the last issue of the Round-up, staff mimeographed newspaper, Best said:

"The spirit of this staff will live on, and every member of it will carry with him the legacy of unprecedented success in an unprecedented job carried to completion in an unprecedented way. To its very end Tulelake has no precedent even within the precincts of WRA. We—all of us together—relocated more people in less time than any other center, and when the physical properties of Tulelake center are turned over to the succeeding and liquidating agency at the end of next week, we will have done in 45 days a closure job which has required an average of three months elsewhere. Of these accomplishments we justly can be proud."

Members of the WRA staff remaining at the camp during the closing-out period will be widely scattered after next week. Best plans to remain with his family in Tulelake until the end of school, and then probably will return to Idaho, where he lived before taking the job at Tulelake center. Harry L. Black, Best's assistant, will continue with WRA, moving to Washington, D. C.

Ralph C. Brown, reports officer, will go to Phoenix, Ariz.

Bowles Jumps Autos, Bread

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—OPA Tuesday raised retail price ceilings for General Motors automobiles by \$16 to \$60 to compensate for wage increases in the industry.

The price hikes, effective immediately, range from \$16 to \$30 on Pontiacs and Oldsmobile models; from \$18 to \$38 on Buicks; and from \$24 to \$60 on Cadillacs.

The increase is \$18 for the only Chevrolet model which has been priced earlier on the basis of manufacturing costs prior to the wage increase of 18 1/2 cents hourly recently granted by GM. The one model given a ceiling previously was the Chevrolet \$30 of Pontiacs and Oldsmobile Stylemaster four door sedan.

On other Chevrolet models being priced for the first time, retail ceilings range from \$51 to \$68 above 1942 prices.

Rye Bread Up Too
WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—OPA Tuesday raised retail prices for most rye bread two cents a one-pound loaf, and an official of the agency told a reporter privately that housewives soon may pay more for white bread and other kinds.

Lions Hear Chief, Favor Time Change
Chief of Police Orville Hamilton outlined various phases of the workings of his department at the regular Tuesday meeting of the Klamath Lions club at the Willard hotel, pointing out that his force was undermanned at the present and that little relief was in sight due to budget limitations.

The Lions club also voted to go on record as favoring daylight saving time for Oregon this year. New members John Schubert, Frank Sparkman and Martin Putnam, transferred from Eugene, were introduced.

French Loan Said On Way

PARIS, May 1 (AP)—French official quarters said today that President Truman in a telephone conference with Foreign Minister Bidault, had promised that the requested American loan to France was on its way.

The French said President Truman also pledged United States assistance in meeting France's food needs, particularly on wheat, in the next two months.

French official quarters were visibly elated by the assurances they said they had received from the American president.

Bidault himself returned to the foreign office in high spirits after a three-hour conference with U. S. Secretary of State James F. Byrnes who was reported to have telephoned the president while Bidault was there.

USS ASTORIA TO PORTLAND
PORTLAND, May 1 (AP)—The navy will assign the light cruiser USS Astoria to Portland during the Rose Festival celebration, Mayor Riley reported today.

Secretary of Navy Forrestal reported the new cruiser Oregon City, requested by the festival officials, will remain in the Atlantic until June 10 when it will join the Atlantic fleet.
