Wiesendanger said that "Stop Forest Fires" week will come in mid-May, with a parade, banquet, and other details to be announced later.

Josephine County Defeats Tax Raise

GRANTS PASS, May 1 (AP)—Taxpayers of the Josephine county school district yesterday defeated a 1946-47 budget to exceed the six per cent limitation by nearly two to one and a proposed \$300,000 bond issue for new school construction by nearly three to one.

Only four school sub-districts carried the budget, while two of these defeated the bond proposal. Three of the 18 sub-districts in the county district favored the bond issue, one of which was Murphy where a new school would be built with the bonds, but this district defeated the budget.
