

Stalin Alerts Reds To Chance Of New War

MOSCOW, May 1 (AP)—A colorful demonstration by hundreds of thousands of Moscow's workers and a long parade by soldiers, sailors and airmen, advised by Generalissimo Stalin not to forget for a minute "the intrigues of international reaction which is hatching plans of a new war," marked the Soviet Union's observance of May Day today.

Although the Soviet leader gave first place in his order of

the day to "our valiant armed forces," he told his people: "There is no reason to doubt that in the future the Soviet Union will be true to its policy—the policy of peace and security, the policy of equality and friendship of the peoples."

Keep Strong Armed Forces
Stalin exhorted the Russian armed forces to remain strong and increase their effectiveness by lessons learned from the war "on the basis of development of science and technique," but it was noted that the traditional military parade before Lenin's tomb in the Red Square was cut a half hour from the regular two-hour review.

"Now our armed forces are faced with a task of no less importance—vigilantly to guard the peace which was won and the constructive labor of the Soviet people, to be the reliable bulwark of the interest of the Soviet Union."

"The successful accomplishment of this honorable task is possible only on condition of further growth of military culture and military skill of the officers and men of our army, our navy and our aviation."

Exhorts Workers
Stalin urged Russian workers to reach and even exceed the goals set in the nation's new five-year plan.

"Developing peaceful socialist construction," Stalin's order declared, "We should not forget for a minute the intrigues of international reaction, which is hatching plans of a new war. It is necessary to remember the teaching of the great Lenin to the effect that after switching over to peaceful labor, it is necessary to be constantly vigilant, to protect as the apple of one's eye the armed forces and defensive powers of our country."

5 U.S. Scribes Held By Reds

CHANGCHUN, May 1 (AP)—Five American correspondents have been detained here by the communists under so-called "protective" house arrest since their capture with the fall of this Manchurian capital April 16.

The correspondents have protested repeatedly that they are being held under armed guard, but without effect.

Once, on a single occasion only, they were permitted to take a walk under guard through the city. Two of their cameras were seized.

They are adequately lodged and are able to buy food.

They request that official steps be taken to secure their release and their safe return to Mukden. (Sino-American truce headquarters reported at Peiping today that Chinese said "technical problems" were delaying plans to fly out the correspondents. The statement was not amplified.)

LAKEVIEW, May 1—The executive committee of the Three Flags Highway association, meeting Sunday in the chamber of commerce rooms at Reno, Nev., laid plans for the coming tourist season in which the association will play a major role in inviting travelers to visit historic spots and recreation areas along the famous Three Flags route from the Mexican border to Canada.

Among plans made for promoting traffic over this route are the issuance of four-color card-graph maps, windshield stickers, colorful brochures, and glitter-glass road signs for communities on the Three Flags highway.

Existing colored motion pictures, taken at various spots along the highway, will also be improved for showing before service clubs and other organizations. Approval was given to an exhibit at the forthcoming Outing Show of the Auto Club of Southern California.

Particular emphasis was given to tourist handlers schools to acquaint the public with the type of information desired by the tourist trade. These schools would be constructed in all the communities and would serve to disseminate information on historic sites, accommodations and other factors of interest to the tourist.
